

Rules of Order

- 1. Each session of this body will be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Correspondence may be opened with other Baptist Associations at such time and places as may be deemed proper.
- 3. Visiting brethren may be invited to seats, who may be invited to speak, but not to vote.
- 4. The election of officers provided for in the constitution shall take place immediately after enrollment of messengers.
- 5. Without a second, no motion will be discussed, and motions lost shall not be recorded unless so ordered at the time.
- 6. Motions containing two or more points shall be divided at the request of any member voting.
- 7. Everyone desiring to speak must rise and address the moderator. No one shall speak more than once without permission of the body.
- 8. The moderator shall be the judge of order. Any brother may appeal from the moderator's decision.
- 9. The moderator shall appoint a parliamentarian at the beginning of each annual session and biannual session to advise him on procedural matters.
- 10. All committees shall be nominated by the moderator or some other member, subject however, to the approval of the body.
- 11. These rules may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of the body.

Constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi formerly (Mississippi Baptist Association)

Article I — Name

Section 1: This body shall be known as the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi (formerly Mississippi Baptist Association).

Article II — Object

The object of the association shall be:

Section 1: To aid in the preaching of the Gospel throughout the world.

Section 2: To promote fellowship among the churches of the association.

Section 3: To cooperate in benevolent and educational activities consistent with the Scripture and beneficial to the purposes of this association.

Article III — Principles Of Cooperation

Section 1: This body shall be composed of such regular Baptist churches as may adhere to the Doctrinal Statement and Article I of this Constitution.

Section 2: A church desiring membership in this body shall present a petitionary letter with a statement that in regular conference she has adopted the Doctrinal Statement and Constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 3: This Association shall recognize the sovereignty of each local church.

Section 4: This Association shall exercise no ecclesiastical authority over any church.

Section 5: A two-thirds majority vote shall be required for receiving a new church into membership.

Section 6: Each church of this association shall be entitled to three messengers duly elected from her membership.

Section 7: Each church shall be the sole judge of the qualifications of her messengers.

Section 8: This Association shall recognize the Scripture as the final authority in all things pertaining to the work of this body.

Article IV — Officers

Section 1: The officers of this association shall be: President, First Vice-president, Second Vice-president, one Recording Secretary, one Assistant Recording Secretary and a Director of Public Information. Any officer nominated must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church.

Section 2: The presiding officers of this association are as follows: President, First Vice-president, Second Vice-president, elected annually to assume the duties of the respective officers at the conclusion of the annual session in which they are elected, whose term shall not exceed two consecutive years.

Section 3: Duties of officers:

- A. The president shall preside over the business meeting of the association and shall be charged with keeping order, governed by parliamentary procedure.
- B. The vice-presidents shall assist the president in the above named responsibilities and shall preside in the absence of the president.
- C. The recording secretary shall record all business transactions of the association and shall publish the minutes in book form. These are to be distributed to the churches as soon as possible since these minutes shall constitute a report to the churches.
- D. The recording secretary shall also serve as the treasurer of the minute and associational fund of the association.
- E. The assistant recording secretary shall assist in all the duties of the recording secretary.
- F. The duties of the director of public information shall be to work with the program committee in planning for the annual meeting of the association and to publicize the work of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article V — Time Of Meeting

(Annual Session)

Section 1: The association shall hold her annual meeting on Tuesday and Wednesday following the third (3rd) Sunday of October, unless determined otherwise by the messengers in annual session.

Section 2: The President shall be empowered to call this body into special session in an emergency to deal with matters for which the session was called.

Article VI — Schedule Of Meeting

Section 1: The churches composing the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall meet one time between annual session.

Section 2: The time of meeting shall be Tuesday after the third Sunday in May at 9:30 a.m., unless determined otherwise by the messengers. The October meeting shall be the annual association.

Section 3: Each church may elect three messengers as set forth by example in II Corinthians, Chapter Eight (8).

Section 4: The purpose of the meetings shall be to:

- A. Hear and approve departmental reports.
- B. To implement (carry out) the plans and objectives of each department as adopted in annual session.
- **Section 5:** The officers elected in the annual meeting shall serve as officers of the meetings.
- **Section 6**: The order of reports shall be the same as the preceding annual session.

Article VII — Committees

Section 1: Individuals serving on the following committees must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church.

Section 2: Nominating Committee:

- A. The association shall choose a nominating committee composed of six members. These shall be elected by nomination from the floor in regular session.
- B. These shall serve for terms of two years on a staggered basis so that three member's terms expire each year. These members are not to succeed themselves.
- C. This committee shall have the responsibility of consulting with each department Director concerning any committee of trustee vacancies and/or re-electable members and to consider any recommendation they might have.
- D. This committee will have the responsibility of presenting nominees for all standing committees or trustees and shall diligently seek to give equal representation to all sections of the state.
- E. A member of this committee will not be presented as a nominee unless that member is currently serving on a board of trustees or standing committee and is eligible for another term.

Section 3: Program Committee:

- A. The program committee shall consist of the president, the recording secretary, and the head of each department listed in Article VIII, Section 1.
- B. This committee shall also be responsible for planning the agenda of the annual session. The department reporting first each year shall go to the bottom of the list for next year, and thus each department moves up one number each year.
- C. The recording secretary shall be authorized to cover any expenses of the Program Committee from the minute and associational fund.

Section 4: Committee on Digest of Letters and Finance:

The president shall appoint a committee of three to receive letters and finances sent by the churches. This committee shall be appointed one (1) year in advance and their names shall be printed in the minutes. In the event a member is absent, the president shall appoint substitutes.

Section 5: Salary Committee:

- A. All officials of the association are to be paid according to the designation of this association in annual session.
- B. The chairman of all committees having salaried personnel under their supervision shall serve as a committee on salaries to make recommendations to the association on salary ceilings for all department heads and their assistants who are elected by the association.
- C. In case of an emergency between sessions of the association, this committee will receive and make recommendations subject to approval of the association.
- D. This Committee shall publish annually in the minute book, the salary and benefits of department heads.

Article VIII — Departments Of Work

Section 1: This association sponsors the following departments of work:

- 1. State Missions
- 2. Southeastern Baptist College
- 3. Mississippi Baptist Children's Home
- 4. Christian Publications
- 5. Youth Department
- 6. Commissions:
 - A. Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives.
 - B. Moral Action of Mississippi
 - C. Mississippi Baptist Commission on Senior Adult Ministry
- 7. Auxiliaries:
 - A. State Brotherhood
 - B. State Women's Missionary Auxiliary
- Foundations
 - A. Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc.

Section 2: The Special Emphasis for the departments shall be: Publications — January; History and Archives — February; Youth — March; Missions — April and May; Senior Adult Commission — June; College — July and August; Moral Action of Mississippi — September; Children's Home — October and November.

Article IX — Election Of Heads Of Departments

Section 1: The head of each department shall be recommended to the association by the trustees or committee of each department or any messenger for consideration and election in Annual Session or a special called session for filling such position and shall be elected indefinitely. Upon assuming the duties of the office to which they have been elected, the department head must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church.

Section 2: If a vacancy occurs, the trustees or committee of each department shall be responsible to maintain said department until a qualified person can be recommended to the association.

Section 3: Any department head that violates the trust of his office may be released by the trustees or committee to which he is subservient without further financial obligations; said action of trustees or committee to be reviewed at the next session of the association. Furthermore, any department head may be removed during any session (regular or special) of the association, provided the following criteria is met:

- 1. A motion to remove the department head is offered from a registered messenger present.
- 2. A second to that motion is offered by a registered messenger present.
- 3. After ample time for discussion has been provided by the chair, a motion and second to end discussion is approved by a majority of registered messengers present and voting.
- 4. During a subsequent session of the association, said motion passes with a twothirds majority of registered messengers present and voting.

Section 4: Each Department head shall furnish the Nominating Committee a list of the Trustees, (1) who are eligible for re-election, (2) who need to be replaced, (3) who are serving an unfulfilled term. This information shall be given to the Nominating Committee by August 15 of each year.

Article X — Standing Committee Or Trustees

Section 1: This association, in annual session, shall elect committeemen or trustees as specified in each department by-laws. Upon assuming the duties of the office to which they have been elected, the committeeman or trustee must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church unless there is an exemption stated in the by-laws of a specific Department or Commission.

Section 2: Each Department head shall furnish the Nominating Committee a list of the Trustees, (1) who are eligible for re-election, (2) who need to be replaced, (3) who are serving an unfulfilled term. This information shall be given to the Nominating Committee by August 15 of each year.

Section 3: All standing committeemen or trustees shall be elected on a staggered basis for three-year terms, one third being elected each year. No one may serve on more than one standing committee. The committeemen or trustees shall be limited to three (3), 3-year terms. After a one-year absence from that committee the former member shall become eligible for reelection to that committee. A standing committee is the board of trustees or committeemen of any department or commission listed in Article VIII, section 1.

Section 4: No one who is an employee of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall serve on a committee or board of trustees under whose supervision he may come except legal status would require otherwise.

Section 5: The duties of said committeemen or trustees are set forth in the by-laws of each department.

Section 6: Any standing committeeman or trustee of any department who misses three (3) consecutive meetings will be automatically replaced.

Article XI — Amendments

The Constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi may be amended by the two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at any annual session of the association. When the amendment is desired, it will be offered in writing in any session, morning, afternoon or evening; its adoption moved and seconded, and thoroughly discussed. At a subsequent session the vote will be taken without further discussion.

The by-laws of the various departments of associational work of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi may be amended in annual session in like manner as an amendment to the Constitution as set forth above. However, the by-laws can also be amended in midyear sessions when the churches have had prior notification of the proposed changes in the "Mississippi Baptist" and/or by letter sent to each church of the association. The same procedure of voting on the amendment will be used in a midyear session as in an annual session. Rules and regulations established by the Constitution, or the by-laws of any department can be suspended at any session of the association. The suspension is to be for a specified period of time and the need for the suspension is to be stated. A two-thirds majority vote is required.

The Doctrinal Statement of the BMA of Mississippi may be amended by 2/3 majority vote of the messengers present and voting at any annual session of the association. In case the proposed amendment is referred to the churches, and the churches send their vote by letter, or by instructed messengers, and 2/3 of the churches thus reporting express the desire for the amendment, the amendment shall pass. No particular form will be required.

Doctrinal Statement

Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi

The churches of this Association heartily subscribe to and agree to defend and promulgate the historic Missionary Baptist Faith and Practice, the interpretation of which is tersely stated as follows:

- 1. The Trinity of God.
- 2. The infallible and plenary verbal inspiration of the Scripture.
- 3. The Biblical account of creation.
- 4. The personality of Satan.
- 5. Hereditary and total depravity of man in his natural state involving his fall in Adam.
 - 6. The virgin birth and deity of Jesus Christ.
- 7. Christ's blood atonement for fallen man. We believe Christ died for the sins of the whole world (John 1:29; I Tim. 2:4-6; Heb. 2:9) that through His blood, atonement for sin is made without respect of persons. Anyone who will exercise repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ (Acts 20:21) will be saved. Although all men can be saved, some will reject God's redemption by exercise of their free will.
 - 8. His bodily resurrection and ascension back to his Father.
 - 9. The Person and work of the Holy Spirit.
- 10. Justification before God by faith without any admixture of works. All such justified persons are in the family of God.
 - 11. Separation of God's children from the world.
- 12. Water baptism (immersion) to be administered to believers only and by Divine authority as given to missionary Baptist churches.
- 13. The Lord's Supper, a church ordinance to be administered to baptized believers only in scriptural church capacity.
 - 14. Eternal security of the believer.
- 15. The establishment of a visible church by Christ Himself during His personal ministry on earth; and His churches are not now, nor have they ever been, universal or invisible.
- 16. Worldwide missions according to the Great Commission which Christ gave His church. (Matthew 28:19, 20).
- 17. The perpetuity of missionary Baptist churches from Christ's day on earth until His second coming.
- 18. The right of scriptural churches to be held as equal units, in their associated capacities, with equal rights and privileges for all.
- 19. The subjection of all scriptural associational assemblies and their committees to the will of the churches, so that they shall forever remain as servants of the churches originating them.
- 20. The separation of the Lord's Church from all so-called churches or church alliance which advocate, practice, or uphold heresies and other human innovations, which are not in harmony with the Word of God. Open communion, alien baptism, pulpit affiliation with heretical churches, modernism, modern tongues movement, and all kindred evils arising from these practices are unscriptural.
- 21. The only valid baptism is that administered by the authority of a scriptural missionary Baptist church. Any so-called Baptist church which knowingly receives alien baptism, habitually practices this or other evils as those listed in statement 20 cannot be a scriptural Baptist church, nor can its ordinances remain valid.
 - 22. The personal, bodily and imminent return of Christ to earth.

- 23. The bodily resurrection of the dead.
- 24. The reality of heaven, involving Divine assurance of eternal happiness for the redeemed of God.
- 25. The reality of hell, involving everlasting punishment of the incorrigible wicked.
 - 26. We believe in the absolute separation of Church and State.
- 27. Biblical Marriage God, having created male and female, instituted their union in marriage. God designed marriage as the covenantal relationship of one biological man and one biological woman for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church. God provides in marriage the context for the only appropriate sexual desires and behaviors and the only means for procreation of the human race. The God-ordained institution of marriage is not subject to redefinition or re-interpretation by human means or practice. Forgiveness and reconciliation are found in God's atonement which is without respect of persons. (Gen. 1:27-28; Genesis 2:18-25; Matt. 19:3-9; Lev. 18:22-25; Prov. 5:18-19; Mark 10:6-9; Rom. 1:18-32; 1 Cor. 6:9-11,16; Eph. 5:22-33; Heb. 13:4)

NOTE: The following statements are not to be binding upon the churches already affiliated with this association, nor to require adoption by churches petitioning this body for privileges of cooperation, nor to be a test of fellowship between brethren or churches. However, they do express the preponderance of opinion among the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

- 1. We believe in the premillenial return of Christ to earth, which He shall literally reign in peace upon the earth for a thousand years. Rev. 20:4-6
- 2. We believe the Scriptures to teach two resurrections: the first of the righteous at Christ's coming; the second of the wicked dead at the close of the thousand year reign. I Thess. 4:13-17; Rev. 20:4-6, 12-15.
- 3. Whereas most of our people believe in and use the King James Version as the Word of God, we ask that any speakers at any associational meeting, camp or conference sponsored by any Department of the association use the KJV.

Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Mid-year Meeting Southeastern Baptist College May 21, 2024

Morning Session

The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi met on May 21, 2024, at 9:30 a.m. at Southeastern Baptist College. Bro. Carey Jones led in the opening song a medley of "I'll Fly Away and In The Sweet By and By."

Bro. Adam Sloan shared a scripture from Psalm 97:9-12 with a brief devotion entitled "Sewing Seeds of Light" and opened in prayer. Dr. Scott Carson gave the welcome on behalf of Southeastern Baptist College. Bro. Dennis Knight responded on behalf of the association.

At the sound of the gavel, Moderator Ken Riley called the meeting to order. The Moderator offered thanks to Dr. Carson, the faculty and student body of SBC for so graciously hosting the meeting. He also thanked Clerk Sam Oglesby and Assistant Clerk Ted Quinby for all the preparation that was done to prepare for this meeting and Mississippi Baptist Editor Don Brown for his work in promoting the meeting. The Moderator stated, "that we be encouraged, motivated, and informed throughout the meeting as we hear the reports from all the Departments of our work."

The Moderator appointed Bro. Frank Panzerino as Parliamentarian for the meeting.

The Moderator read the Rules of Order and requested that messengers please stand and go to a microphone when speaking.

The Moderator called for any Constitutional Changes. After some discussion, a motion carried to suspend the rules to allow The History and Archives Department to bring the following changes to their bylaws presented by Director Glen Pace:

Article III - Staff

Section 1: Trustees

- (a) The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect six trustees to serve three-year terms on a staggered basis. Two shall be elected each year; four of these shall constitute a quorum.
- (b) The trustees will be nominated by the nominating committee of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- (c) The trustees shall elect annually from their number a chairman, assistant chairman, secretary, and assistant secretary.
 - (d) Duties of Trustees:
 - 1. To act as a council to the director of this commission.
- 2. To carry out the wishes of our churches in all matters concerning this commission.
 - 3. To approve an annual budget.
 - 4. Promote the commission.
 - 5. Assist and encourage the gathering of material for the commission.
- 6. To present a nominee to the association to serve as director of this commission.

Section 1: Director – will become Section 2, Section 2: Librarian and Designated Personnel – will become Section 3, and Section 3: Historian – will become Section 4.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the proposed changes to the Bylaws of the Commission on History and Archives. After discussion was given, it was laid over to the Afternoon Session for a vote.

The Moderator made the following statement and request: "Over the past several months it has been brought to my attention the concern of many churches across the state who feel that when the State Association assembles it should be allowed to vote a Director out by 2/3 majority with good cause. Their concern is they do not have a say in the matter as they once did. If the Association would allow me, I would like to appoint a committee of (3) three men to look into this over the nest several months. They will be expected to:

- 1. Bring a recommendation back when we assemble in October for our Annual Meeting.
- 2. If their recommendations require any by-law changes, they are to be printed in the Mississippi Baptist Paper at least one month before our Annaul Meeting.
- 3. This would give everyone time to pray over the matter before coming to the Annual Meeting in October.

At this time, I would entertain a motion. A motion carried to allow this request. Permission was given to the Moderator to appoint a committee of (3) three, Sam Freeman, Ted Quinby, and Ken Riley.

The Enrollment Committee was called on to give their initial report. Bro. Chris Sledge gave the following report: Churches present – 30, Messengers – 59, Visitors – 8, Total present – 67. A motion carried to adopt their initial report.

The Nominating Committee presented the following report:

We recommend that the 3 members, Robert Arinder, Genny Singleton, and Shirley Quinby, appointed by the Director of the Commission on History and Archives, now serving as a temporary Board of Trustees, be elected as permanent and an additional three nominees to be presented at the annual meeting as additional candidates. We move for the adoption of this recommendation.

-Ted Quinby Chairman

A motion carried to adopt their report with its recommendations. The Nominating Committee also presented Joey Reus to serve on the Missionary Committee to fill the unfinished term of John Michael Pollin and Justin Burdick to serve on the Youth Committee to fill the unfinished term of Cliff Jenkins. Motion carried to approve their recommendations.

Department. Commission. and Agency Reports Began:

The Youth Department was called on to give their report. Trustee Chairman Rick Clark called on the Clerk to read the minutes. He called on Director Anders Lee to give his report. A motion carried to adopt their report.

The Moderator called on the WMA to give their report. President Dawn Freeman gave her report. A motion carried to adopt their report.

The Moderator called on Southeastern Baptist College to give their report. Chairman Glen Pace called on President Scott Carson to give his report. Chairman Pace called for the reading of the minutes. Bro. Sam Oglesby read the minutes. A motion carried to adopt their report.

Bro. Larry Barker gave a brief report on behalf of the Global Missions Department.

Bro. Carey Jones led the congregation in singing, "How Great is Our God."

The Moderator called on Dr. John Adams to bring the message. Dr. Adams brought the message from Psalm 71 entitled, "Old Age." Bro. James Sprayberry expressed appreciation to Dr. John Adams for the message.

The Moderator asked for any prayer request and called on Bro. Estuardo Marroquin to read Scripture and close in prayer. Bro. Estuardo read Scripture from Ephesians 4 and closed out the Morning Session with prayer. Dismissed for Lunch Break at 11:30 a.m. to meet back at 1:00 p.m.

Afternoon Session - 1:00 p.m.

MINUTES OF THE 218th ANNUAL SESSION of the BMA of Mississippi Campground Baptist Church, Gulfport, Mississippi Tuesday, October 22, 2024

Morning Session

Session One began at 9:30 a.m. with music led by Jonathan Freeman of <u>Campground Baptist Church</u>. The Meeting was called to Order by the Moderator, Ken Riley who at the sound of the gavel, declared the 218th Annual Session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi to be open and ready to transact business!"

The welcome by the Host Church was extended by Pastor Sam Freeman, Campground Baptist Church.

The Response on behalf of the churches was given by Brother Sidney Davis. Moderator Ken Riley offered a thank you to the following:

"Thank you to Campground Baptist Church and Pastor Sam Freeman for hosting the meeting and showing such kindness already to the BMA of MS.

Thank you to the Program Committee for all their hard work.

Thank you to Clerk Sam Oglesby and Assistance Clerk Ted Quinby for all they do to make sure things are kept in order.

Thank you to Mississippi Baptist Editor Don Brown for his work on getting the directors reports in the paper on time and having the brochures available today.

Thank you to each church and the messengers that have come to participate in our 218^{th} Session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi."

The Moderator called on Brother Harold Floyd to give the opening prayer.

The Moderator appointed Brother Frank Panzerino as Parliamentarian for the meeting.

The Moderator read the "Rules of Order", asked the messengers to please stand and to go to a microphone when speaking, and to otherwise, participate in the meeting!)

A special in song was presented by Bro. David Hook, Chairman of the Music Department at SBC.

Bro. Ken Riley Introduced the Theme - "Focus to be the Best: (John 9:1-4) and preached the President's Message.

Bro. Sam Freeman presented a special in song entitled, "Were It Not For Grace."

The Moderator called for The Constitutional Changes to be presented. Motion and second to approve the changes. After discussion they were laid over till the afternoon session for a vote.

The Moderator called for the special appointed committee to give their report. The <u>Special Appointed Committee</u> unanimously agreed to make the following recommendations along with the necessary bylaw changes:

Article IX – Election of Heads of Departments

Section 3: Any department head that violates the trust of his office may be released by the trustees or committee to which he is subservient without further financial obligations; said action of trustees or committee to be reviewed at the next session of the association. Furthermore, any department head may be removed during any session (regular or special) of the association, provided the following criteria is met:

- 1. A motion to remove the department head is offered from a registered messenger present.
 - 2. A second to that motion is offered by a registered messenger present.
- 3. After ample time for discussion has been provided by the chair, a motion and second to end discussion is approved by a majority of registered messengers present and voting.
- 4. During a subsequent session of the association, said motion passes with a two-thirds majority of registered messengers present and voting. (Proposed addition in red.)

-Sam Freeman Chairman, Ted Quinby Clerk, Ken Riley Committeeman The Missions Department presented the following By-Laws Changes:

Department of Missions - By-Laws Article I - Name

This department shall be known as the Department of Missions. (**No changes made, other than removing "Section 1" heading. Since there are no other sections, this heading was not needed.)

Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this department shall be to preach the Gospel of Christ, to establish and equip churches, and to be a resource for strengthening and stabilizing churches. This includes:

Promoting this purpose among the churches that compose the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, and Cooperating and working with other departments of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, local associations, other state associations, and the Baptist Missionary Association of America in the preaching of the Gospel in all the world.

(**Updated the purpose to be more comprehensive. Sections 2 & 3 were made subsets of the purpose, and the tense of the verbs was changed for better flow/presentation. Section 4 "Offices" was moved to Article IV- Director of Missions/RLF, where it fits better based on category/function.)

Article III - Missionary Committee

Section 1: Members

The messengers of the churches shall elect nine (9) committeemen, five of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said committeemen shall be elected to serve for a period of three (3) years on a staggered basis, one third being elected each year. Section 2: Duties

The Committee shall, in the event of a vacancy in the position of Director of Missions, refer to Article IX, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and follow the guidelines presented there.

The Committee shall act in collaboration with the Director of Missions in matters that concern this department.

The Committee shall act in collaboration with the Director of Missions concerning missionary personnel when necessary.

The Committee shall counsel, along with the Director of Missions, local mission churches, assisting missionaries in their service to the mission and to the state association.

The Committee shall investigate and bring before the association recommendations which it feels is in the best interest of the work of missions.

The Committee shall seek out qualified and available personnel to serve as missionaries and be authorized to place them on the field between sessions (to be

approved at the next meeting of the association), provided all qualifications have been met according to Article V - i.e., no extenuating circumstances.

The Committee shall investigate the qualifications of each prospective missionary.

The Committee shall examine the salary schedule of the department annually. The Committee shall investigate when a missionary's work becomes unsatisfactory, if his doctrinal beliefs are in question, or if his moral character or that of his immediate family (who are living with him) becomes contrary to Biblical standards. If found to be unsatisfactory, upon the recommendation of the Committee, the salary of said missionary shall be withheld until the next meeting of the

The Committee shall provide, upon the resignation of any missionary, a salary of up to three weeks following his resignation.

No committee member shall be given as a reference by anyone applying for missionary status.

(**The title for Section 2 was changed to "Duties" and each point was reworded into a complete sentence for uniformity with Article IV's "The director shall" sentences. A new condition was added to the beginning of Section 2 and was numbered 2:1; all other conditions have been moved down the in the list order by one. Updated the phrase "to act in council" to "shall act in collaboration with" for a modernized and more precise vocabulary. Section 2:4, formerly Section 2:3, was reworded for clarity. An additional condition has been added to the end of Section 2:6, formerly 2:5. Section 2:8, formerly 2:7, has been reworded for clarity. Section 2:9, formerly sections 2:8 and 2:9, had been combined and reworded for more precise, less vague vocabulary. Section 2:10 has been reworded for clarity. Minor corrections in spelling and vocabulary.)

Article IV - Director of Missions and Revolving Loan Fund

Section 1: Election

association for approval.

The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a Director of Missions and Revolving Loan Fund.

Section 2: Salary

The Director shall receive such compensation as may be designated by the Association.

Section 3: Offices

The Director's office (and additional spaces for personnel/operations, as needed) shall be maintained at such places as may be designated by the Association. Section 4: Vacation and Revivals

The Director shall be allowed two weeks paid vacation per year and shall be permitted to retain the proceeds from five revivals each year.

Section 5: Duties

The Director shall serve as Executive Director of the Missions Department, to execute the programs and plans voted by the Association.

The Director shall serve as treasurer of the General Fund and shall receive and disburse all funds as designated.

The Director shall assume general supervision of the Missions and Revolving Loan Fund Department.

The Director shall maintain necessary records, purchase equipment and supplies, and employ such help as authorized by the Missionary Committee to fulfill this responsibility according to accepted standards.

The Director shall work with each missionary in the selection of a field of work, location, organization, building, and financing.

The Director is authorized to promote the work of missions among the churches in any manner consistent with the principles of this Association.

The Director shall work with all committees of the Missions Department in carrying out the will of the churches of this association.

The Director, with the advice and counsel of the Missionary Committee, is authorized to withhold payment of monies which would, in their opinion, affect the welfare of the institution. This action would be subject to the approval of the Association at the next meeting.

The Director shall give reports at each meeting and shall give a detailed report in the annual session of this Association and shall present a proposed plan of work and a proposed budget for the ensuing year.

The Director shall plan missions and evangelistic conferences (dates, locations, and programs).

(**Since the subset number "1" is unnecessary for sections that only have one statement or condition, they have been removed. A new section has been added and given the designation "Section 3: Offices"; this content was formerly underneath Article 2's "Purpose" section but has been moved since it better functions underneath the Director's responsibilities. All sections following this new addition have been moved down in list order by one. Section 5:10, formerly Section 4:10, has been changed to reflect multiple conferences planned rather than just one. Minor corrections in spelling and grammar.)

Article V - Missionaries

Section 1: Employment Needs

This Association shall employ missionaries as the Spirit of God may direct. Section 2: Guidelines for State Missionary Status

The applicant must have a minimum of two years pastoral experience in a BMAA church(es). Even though the applicant may not be pastoring at the present time, his previous two years' membership shall have been in a BMAA church(es).

The applicant must meet Biblical qualifications as stated in I Timothy 3:1-7.

The applicant must express a burden for a specific field of service.

The applicant must demonstrate an attitude of loyalty and cooperation with the departments of our associated work.

The applicant must understand that measurable growth toward self-support status is expected by the Association.

Section 3: Process for State Missionary Employment

A prospective missionary must fill out the required questionnaire, and it must be in the Missions Office at least fifteen (15) days prior to being considered by the Missionary Committee.

A prospective missionary must present to the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee two (2) recommendations: one from the church where they currently hold membership and one from the last church pastored.

A prospective missionary must be approved by the Missionary Committee before being considered for missionary status. This entails a thorough vetting process, with verification of all recommendations and confirmation that the prospective missionary meets all guidelines for missionary status (Section 2).

Any extenuating circumstances deviating from Section 2 or Section 3 of this Article may be considered; however, they must be resolved to the satisfaction of the Missionary Committee prior to endorsement by the Association.

In the event any of the guidelines of Section 2 or the process of Section 3 cannot be met properly by the prospective missionary, his missionary status will be delayed until the next meeting for Association action. Although vetted and then approved by the Missionary Committee, final approval and endorsement of a prospective missionary must be obtained from the Association.

Section 4: Duties

A missionary is required to counsel with the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee in all matters that shall affect a change in location, finance, etc. of his mission endeavor.

A missionary is to notify the Missions Office when he is to be absent from his mission.

A missionary shall render monthly statistical and financial reports to the Director of Missions.

A missionary shall give reports to the Association when called upon to do so. Section 5: Benefits

A missionary who becomes ill or disabled shall receive full pay for a period of three months. Conditions extending past this period will be reviewed and presented at the next Association meeting.

A missionary shall be allowed two weeks paid vacation, and he shall be permitted five (5) revivals per year (retaining the proceeds). He shall not have two (2) revivals in succession or be out of the mission's pulpit on Sunday mornings more than two (2) Sundays a year.

A missionary's moving expenses shall be paid when moving upon the field or when changing fields. Up to \$150.00 in miscellaneous expenses is also authorized in a change of fields.

(**This entire Article has been restructured: each section was given a title to keep uniformity with the other Articles and its contents have been rearranged and grouped underneath the appropriately titled sections for better flow and ease of search. Additional requirements and wording that have been added to this article are in red apart from minor spelling and grammar corrections. The previous requirement of "Applicant must have tenure and show growth at previous pastorates." has been removed from this article- former section 12:b of the old article.)

Article VI - Cooperation

Section 1: The State Mission's Department is authorized to cooperate with local churches and local associations of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in mission endeavors when approved by the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee. It is also authorized to cooperate with other state associations and the national association in mission endeavors when approved by the Association in either annual or other sessions.

Section 2: Missionaries under the above joint sponsorships must meet the qualifications and requirements of the State Mission's Department.

Section 3: Guidelines For Cooperation

When a church or an association desires to cooperate with the State Mission's Department in a mission project, they shall counsel with the Director of Missions before interviewing and electing a missionary. Likewise, the State Missions Department shall counsel with the local church and/or local association before electing a missionary to work in a joint project.

When an association or church is impressed with a preacher for missionary status, they shall request the Missionary Committee of the State Association to meet with them and interview the said preacher before electing him.

If approved by the joint committees, he shall be recommended back to the association or church that requested the interview for final approval.

(**The subpoints in Section 3 have been changed from letters to numbers for uniformity with the rest of the bylaws) Under Section 1 the word "local" will be removed, and the words, "of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi" added. In the following sentence the word "also" is added. Under Section 3: subsection 1 the word "local" will be moved from its current place to before the word "association".

Article VII - Mission Congregations

Section 1: Missionary Pastor Support

A mission church shall be required to begin pastoral support starting after the first three (3) months of its beginning. The initial amount of support will not be less than ten percent (10%) of the average monthly income. The projected income and expenses of the mission church shall be used as a criteria in establishing the rate of monthly increase. Other instructions may be given to the Director of Missions and Missionary Committee by the messenger body in any session, called or regular. Section 2: Administration

Prior to organization, any and all banking of a mission church must be conducted with the Revolving Loan Fund to ensure complete and proper oversight of the mission church's financial activities.

Section 3: Organization

The Mission congregation shall be required to counsel with both the Director of Missions, the Missionary Committee, and its mother church before organizing into a church.

(** A new section, "Administration", has been added to the article. The former Section 2, "Organization" has been moved down one and an additional requirement has been added to it. Minor corrections in spelling and grammar.)

Article VIII - Services Provided for Established Churches

Because of a sincere desire to minister to our established churches, the Missions Department has the ability to assess the needs of associational churches and to propose ministries that will effectively strengthen those churches. These ministries shall be available for the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 1: Available Ministers List

A list will be maintained for ministers available for occasional fil-in or pastoring.

Ministers on this list must be presently holding membership in a BMAA church. Churches may contact the Missions Office for this list. Names on the list are not recommendations; therefore, churches are encouraged to do their own investigation. Section 2: Guidelines for Establishing Ministries

A potential ministry program shall be presented, explained, and adopted by the Missionary Committee before it can be implemented.

A ministry program, adopted by the Missionary Committee, shall be presented, discussed, and adopted by the Association at an annual or mid-year meeting before funding of the ministry program can be established.

An Established Ministry program shall be reviewed and assessed by the Missionary Committee on a regular basis to determine the effectiveness and financial ability of the Missions Department to support that ministry program.

The availability of any ministry program(s) shall be limited by the financial stability of the Missions Department budget. The first priority of the Missions

Department is the care and provision of its missionaries and its mission churches. Therefore, the availability to offer a ministry program(s) will be subject to the first priority of the Missions Department being accomplished.

Any hired personnel for a ministry program shall be approved by the Missionary Committee.

Section 3: Available Ministries

Revitalize. This ministry exists to assist churches in assessment and providing resources to facilitate a process of revitalization within the church. This ministry offers three levels of partnerships: Refocus, Revitalize, and Replant.

Timothy Apprenticeship. This ministry exists to help equip preachers who are new in the ministry, yet who have expressed a desire to either pastor or plant churches but feel inadequately prepared for the task. This apprenticeship is a two-year process that teaches, equips, and provides hands-on, real-world application and training for those involved.

Summer Internship. This ministry exists to provide an opportunity for young men who feel the calling to the ministry to test the waters of pastoral ministry. The internship provides opportunities for its participants to serve alongside a senior pastor and get introduced to all facets and applications of pastoral ministry.

<u>Camp Ground Baptist Church</u> presented the following Constitutional Changes: Campground Baptist Church, on August 11, 2024, unanimously voted to submit this proposed amendment of the BMA of Mississippi Constitution to the messengers of the BMA of Mississippi churches at its annual meeting on October 22, 2024.

Article IV - Officers

Section 1: After the end of the original sentence in Section 1 add the following: "Any officer nominated must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church."

Article VII: - Committees

All current sections under Article VII will be renumbered Section 2 through Section 5. Add the following: Section 1: Individuals serving on the following committees must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church.

Article IX - Election of Heads of Departments

Section 1: After end of original sentence in Section 1 add the following: "Upon assuming the duties of the office to which they have been elected, the department head must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church."

Article X - Standing Committee or Trustees

Section 1: After the end of the original sentence in Section 1 add the following: "Upon assuming the duties of the office to which they have been elected, the committeeman or trustee must be a member of a BMA of Mississippi church unless there is an exemption stated in the by-laws of a specific department or Commission."

The Nominating Committee presented the following Constitutional Changes: The committee recommends the following changes to our constitution

Article VII - Committees

Section 1: Nominating Committee:

Article IX - Heads Of Departments

Section 4: Each Department head shall furnish the Nominating Committee a list of the Trustees, (1) who are eligible for re election, (2) who need to be replaced, (3) who are serving an unfulfilled term. This information shall be given to the Nominating Committee by August 15th of each year. (Moved to Article X – Standing Committee Or Trustees Section 2)

Article X – Standing Committee Or Trustees

Section 1: This association, in annual session, shall elect committeemen or trustees as specified in each department by-laws.

Section 2: (currently Section 4 of Article IX to become Section 2 in Article X) Each Department head shall furnish the Nominating Committee a list of the Trustees, (1) who are eligible for re-election, (2) who need to be replaced, (3) who are serving an unfulfilled term. This information shall be given to the Nominating Committee by August 15th of each year.

Section 2: ... (becomes 3) All standing committeemen or trustees shall be elected on a staggered basis for three-year terms, one third being elected each year. No one may serve on more than one standing committee. The committeemen or trustees shall be limited to three (3), 3-year terms. After one year absence from that committee, the former ...

Section 3: ... (becomes 4) Section 4: ... (becomes 5) Section 5: ... Constitution and By-Laws of Southeastern Baptist College, Inc.

Article I — Name And Location

This institution shall be known as Southeastern Baptist College. The College is located at 4229 Highway 15 North, Laurel, MS 39440.

Article II — Purpose Mission Statement

Mission

The purpose of Southeastern Baptist College is to glorify God by providing quality post-secondary education from a biblical worldview in a Christian atmosphere.

Goals

Training is provided on campus, online, and through extensions to help prepare people for professional ministry, business administration, or other vocations. Southeastern Baptist College seeks to train students who wish to receive the foundational courses of a college curriculum in a spiritual academic setting. All courses are taught in a manner as to integrate faith and learning, thus giving due recognition to the God of all truth.

Also, Southeastern Baptist College seeks to serve the Christian community by offering a limited number of credit and non-credit courses to those who do not choose to pursue a structured program toward a specific degree, certificate, or diploma.

Article III — Ownership

Southeastern Baptist College is owned and operated by the churches composing the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, who shall exercise ultimate control of said institution.

Article IV — Board Of Trustees

Section 1: Members Of The Board Of Trustees

A. The Messengers of the churches composing the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a Board of Directors consisting of fifteen (15) members who shall be called Trustees. These shall serve for a term of three years on a staggered basis, one-third begin elected each year.

B. In addition to the members of the Board of Trustees elected by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, the Baptist Missionary Association of Alabama shall be entitled to a trustee whom they shall elect; likewise, the Baptist Missionary Association of Florida shall be entitled to one whom they shall elect; and the Baptist Missionary Association of Louisiana shall be entitled to one whom they shall elect. These three state associations (AL, LA, FL) are exempt from the three-year staggered term basis.

C. The President of the College shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees.

D. Five (5) trustees shall constitute a quorum, four of which must have been elected from the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi. No student, or school attached personnel shall hold the office of trustee, unless legal status would require.

Section 2: Duties Of The Board Of Trustees:

A. The Board of Trustees shall have full and complete control of this institution between sessions of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi except in the election of president. When a vacancy occurs between sessions of the association, the president must be approved by the association in special called session after being elected by the board.

- B. The Board shall meet at any time when called by the Chairman of the Board or the president of the college. Regular meetings will be held each quarter.
- C. It shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees to elect the president of the college to be approved by the association; to approve an acceptable list of nominations submitted by the President of administrative officials, faculty, and service staff; and to approve an annual budget submitted to the Board by the President. All transactions of the Board are subject to the approval of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- D. The Board of Trustees shall be authorized to hold title to all properties of Southeastern Baptist College.
- E. The Board of Trustees shall give a report to the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in its annual session, and at other sessions upon request.

Section 3: Officers Of The Board Of Trustees

- A. The trustees shall elect from their membership the following officers in the second quaterly meeting: (1) Chairman; (2) Vice-chairman; (3) Recording Secretary.
- B. The duties of the Board Chairman shall be (1) to preside at board meetings, (2) to work with the President in planning the agenda for each board meeting, (3) to work with the President in planning information and supporting documents in advance of each meeting to assure that the Board will be able to make informed decisions concerning matters on the agenda, (4) to assist the President in the task of educating the Board about the personnel, programs, objectives, and resources of the institution and about their responsibilities as Board members, (5) to represent the Board in matters of policy and conduct of the school.
- C. The duties of the Vice-chairman shall be to assume the responsibilities of the Chairman in his absence.
- D. The duties of the Recording Secretary shall be to maintain records of all board meetings, and to perform official correspondence in the name of the board.
- E. The officers of the board shall serve as the executive committee. The duties of the executive committee shall be to serve in counsel to the President and as an executive of the Board between meetings.

Article V — President Of The College

As the chief executive officer, the President of Southeastern Baptist College shall administer the affairs of the college in keeping with the adopted policies of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and according to the direction of the Board of Trustees. His duties will include the following:

- A. The financial administration of the college.
- B. The administration of the academic program in cooperation with the academic dean and staff.
- C. Traveling among the churches to promote the finances and the enrollment of the college.
- D. Attending educational meetings, or sending representatives, in the interest of the academic welfare of the college.
- E. Reporting to the Board of Trustees, and upon their approval reporting to the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in its annual session. The President shall also report on the financial and academic standing of the College at other sessions of the association.

Article VI — Doctrinal Qualifications Of Teaching Staff

A. Bible and/or Theology

In order for any teacher to teach Bible and/or theology at Southeastern Baptist College, he must sign a statement of belief in and adhere to the doctrinal statements of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

B. Non-Bible/Theology Classes

Teachers in classes other than Bible and/or theology must sign a statement of agreement and belief in the following basic doctrines of the Christian faith:

- 1. The reality and existence of God as presented in the Bible.
- 2. The inspiration and authority of the Bible.
- 3. Salvation by grace apart from works.
- 4. The deity of Jesus Christ and His blood atonement for fallen man.
- 5. The eternal security of the believer.
- 6. The biblical account of creation.

Article VII — Doctrinal Statement

- 1. The Trinity of God.
- 2. The infallible and plenary verbal inspiration of the Scripture.
- 3. The Biblical account of creation.
- 4. The personality of Satan.
- 5. Hereditary and total depravity of man in his natural state involving his fall in Adam.
 - 6. The virgin birth and deity of Jesus Christ.
- 7. Christ's blood atonement for fallen man. We believe Christ died for the sins of the whole world (John 1:29; I Tim. 2:4-6; Heb. 2:9) that through His blood, atonement for sin is made without respect of persons. Anyone who will exercise repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ (Acts 20:21) will be saved. Although all men can be saved, some will reject God's redemption by exercise of their free will.
 - 8. His bodily resurrection and ascension back to his Father.
 - 9. The Person and work of the Holy Spirit.
- 10. Justification before God by faith without any admixture of works. All such justified persons are in the family of God.
 - 11. Separation of God's children from the world.
- 12. Water baptism (immersion) to be administered to believers only and by Divine authority as given to Missionary Baptist Churches.
- 13. The Lord's Supper, a church ordinance to be administered to baptized believers only in scriptural church capacity.
 - 14. Eternal security of the believer.
- 15. The establishment of a visible church by Christ Himself during His personal ministry on earth; and His churches are not now, nor have they ever been, universal or invisible.
- 16. Worldwide missions according to the Great Commission which Christ gave His church. (Matthew 29:19, 20).
- 17. The perpetuity of missionary Baptist churches from Christ's day on earth until His second coming.
- 18. The right of scriptural churches to be held as equal units, in their associated capacities, with equal rights and privileges for all.
- 19. The subjection of all scriptural associational assemblies and their committees to the will of the churches, so that they shall forever remain as servants of the churches originating them.
- 20. The separation of the Lord's Church from all so-called churches or church alliances which advocate, practice, or uphold heresies and other human innovations, which are not in harmony with the Word of God. Open communion, alien baptism, pulpit affiliation with heretical churches, modernism, modern tongues movement, and all kindred evils arising from these practices are unscriptural.
- 21. The only valid baptism is that administered by the authority of a scriptural missionary Baptist church. Any so-called Baptist church which knowingly receives alien baptism, habitually practices this or other evils as those listed in statement 20 cannot be a scriptural Baptist church, nor can its ordinances remain valid.

- 22. The personal, bodily and imminent return of Christ to earth.
- 23. The bodily resurrection of the dead.
- 24. The reality of heaven, involving Divine assurance of eternal happiness for the redeemed of God.
 - 25. The reality of hell, involving everlasting punishment of the incorrigible wicked.
 - 26. We believe in the absolute separation of Church and State.

NOTE: The following statements are not to be binding upon the churches already affiliated with this association, nor to require adoption by churches petitioning this body for privileges of cooperation, nor to be a test of fellowship between brethren or churches. However, they do express the preponderance of opinion among the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

- 1. We believe in the premillenial return of Christ to earth, which He shall literally reign in peace upon the earth for a thousand years. Rev. 20:4-6
- 2. We believe the Scriptures to teach two resurrections: the first of the righteous at Christ's coming; the second of the wicked dead at the close of the thousand year reign. I Thess. 4:13-17; Rev. 20:4-6, 12-15.

Article VIII — Amendments

This constitution and by-laws may be amended according to the guidelines established by and located in the constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

By-Laws Southeastern Baptist College Foundation, Inc.

Article I — Name, Domicile, Fiscal Year and Powers

- 1. The name of the corporation shall be "Southeastern Baptist College Foundation, Inc." Its domicile and principal place of business shall be at the Southeastern Baptist College, 4229 Highway 15 North, Laurel, Jones County, Mississippi. Its corporate seal shall bear the title, "Southeastern Baptist College Foundation, Inc., Laurel, Mississippi", or such condensation thereof as the Trustees may approve. Its fiscal year shall be concurrent with the fiscal year of the college.
- 2. The corporation shall have power: to have and use a corporate seal; to sue and be sued in its corporate name; to take, receive, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, own, hold, conserve, protect, exchange or otherwise deal in and with real or personal property or any interest therein wherever situated and to sell, convey, transfer and otherwise dispose of all or any part of its property and assets and to invest and reinvest the proceeds; to purchase, subscribe for or otherwise acquire, own, hold, vote, use, employ, sell or otherwise dispose of shares or other interests in or obligations of other domestic or foreign corporations, or direct or indirect obligations of the United States or of any instrumentality thereof, but not in violation of any law; to make contracts, conduct affairs, carry on its operations and exercise its powers in any state, territory, district or possession of the United States or in any foreign country; to elect, appoint or employ officers, agents, and employees, and to define their duties and fix the compensation of any employee; to make and alter by-laws not inconsistent with its Articles of Incorporation or with the laws of the United States for the administration and regulation of its affairs; and to have and exercise all powers necessary, convenient or incidental to any and all of the purposes for which it is organized.

Article II — Purpose

1. The general purpose of the corporation shall be to establish, maintain and enlarge a Foundation which shall solicit, acquire and accept gifts, bequeaths and devises of money, stock, bonds, life insurance policies, real property of every nature and kind, and to use those properties exclusively to advance the Christian education,

and to promote the Christian faith generally. These purposes shall include gifts to institutions whose aims and purposes are identical or similar to those of the Foundation. Loans or gifts from the Foundation's income may be made to, or for the benefit of, young men and women in training for the ministry or for full time religious work.

2. The Foundation, upon specific request of a donor, may accept as a conduit gifts whose principal is intended for payment to any cause or for any purpose within those herein above mentioned, including benevolence and charity, and make payment of such principal as directed by the donor.

Article III — Members

- 1. All member churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi are members of the Foundation.
- 2. A regular annual meeting of the members of the Foundation shall be held at the same time and place as the regular annual business meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in each calendar year. Notice of such meetings shall be given for the same time and in like manner as notice is given for the annual meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- 3. Special meetings may be called in the same manner as special meetings of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi. Notice shall be given in the same manner as notice is given for special meetings of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and such notice shall state the purpose of the special meeting.
- 4. Each Foundation member attending shall be entitled to three (3) votes. Ten percent (10%) of the members shall constitute a quorum. If a quorum be not present, the President may recess the meeting from time to time until a quorum shall attend.

Article IV — Officers

- 1. The officers of the Foundation shall be fifteen (15) Trustees who shall have the general charge and management of the Foundation. The President of Southeastern Baptist College shall be an ex-officio Trustee by virtue of his office and his term shall commence and end with his tenure. The fifteen (15) Trustees shall be the same persons who serve as fifteen (15) Trustees of Southeastern Baptist College, Inc., elected by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, and shall be elected in a manner and for the terms specified in the Bylaws of Southeastern Baptist College, Inc. If any Trustee shall die or resign or become unable to serve actively, the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a successor to serve for the remainder of his unexpired term. If a Trustee shall not be elected to any annual meeting, the incumbent shall serve until his successor is elected.
 - 2. Each Trustee, including ex-officio Trustees shall have the right to vote.
- 3.The Trustees shall elect from their number each year a president, vice-president, and recording secretary. The president shall preside at all meetings of the members and of the Trustees and shall have such duties and powers as usually appertain to the office of president. The vice-president shall perform all the duties of the president in his absence or disability. The recording secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings of the members and of the Trustees. The Trustees shall also at their discretion elect a treasurer who shall be responsible for the safekeeping of all foundation funds; sign all checks; keep the books and records; and otherwise perform all duties which appertain to the office of treasurer. For the faithful performance of his duties the treasurer shall be required to give a fidelity bond with a registered security company in such amount as may be required from time to time by the Trustees. In the event that the treasurer elected by the Trustees is not a member of their number, he shall become an ex-officio Trustee for the duration of his tenure.

Article V — Duties And Powers Of Trustees

1. The Trustees shall meet from time to time upon call of the president, or of any

- five (5) Trustees, but at least twice per year. Such meetings must be held at any convenient time and place which the president, or a majority of the Trustees, may fix. At each meeting the treasurer shall give a fully detailed report of the current financial condition of the Foundation and shall, upon request of any Trustee, exhibit the original of all papers, bank accounts, records, and securities of the Foundation. It shall be the duty of each Trustee individually to satisfy himself that the financial affairs of the Foundation are being properly conducted in an efficient manner, but a Trustee shall not be individually liable for any error of judgment or for any action or non-action motivated by good faith.
- 2. The Trustees shall keep the principal of the Foundation invested in time deposits, bonds of the United States or its agencies, other high-grade bonds, or investment grade common or preferred stocks of high quality, for the purposes of obtaining the highest yield consistent with safety and preserving and enhancing the value of the principal. Where feasible, time deposits shall be institutions whose deposits are guaranteed by an instrumentality of the United States Government. Funds may be pooled.
- 3. The Trustees shall, upon receiving any gift or bequest, make a permanent record of any specific designation of the use of the property or income therefrom which may be made by the donor, and it shall be the duty of the Trustees to see that any property or income which has been designated for a specific purpose shall be used for such purpose or institution. The Trustees shall have the right, however, to decline to accept any gift or bequest when in the judgment of five of them, its acceptance would not be to the best interest of the Foundation. A donor may change the designation of the purpose of which his gift shall be used, provided such change shall not impair an outstanding commitment of the Foundation. Where gifts or bequests are made without specific designations of what the property or income therefrom shall be used for, the Trustees shall use such property or income within their discretion in accordance with the purposes of the Foundation.
- 4. At any meeting of the Trustees, five (5) shall constitute a quorum. A majority must concur in any decision or action.
- 5. The Trustees shall engage the services of an independent auditor or accountant to audit the books and records of the Foundation annually, or more often if they deem it necessary. The Trustees shall receive no compensation for their services nor shall any Trustee derive any pecuniary benefit from his office, directly or indirectly. A Trustee may, however, be reimbursed for any out-of-pocket expenditure which he may necessarily make on behalf of the Foundation.
- 6. The Trustees shall submit a detailed report of the financial condition and operation of the Foundation to the members at each annual meeting, and at any other times when the members request such report. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to keep the members fully informed of all financial transactions of the Foundation, except that the Trustees shall not violate any confidence of any donor or beneficiary.
- 7. The Trustees shall pay normal operating expenses of the Foundation out of its income. They may use the office, clerical and accounting facilities of Southeastern Baptist College to such extent as may not impose a burden upon the Southeastern Baptist College, and for the use of such facilities no fees or compensation shall be paid.
- 8. In the event that any purpose or institution for which a contribution to the Foundation has been made should fail, or cease to exist, the Trustees shall be authorized to apply the doctrine of cy pres within their sole discretion.

Article VI

If for any reason, the corporation should be dissolved, or the Foundation terminated, no member of the Foundation or of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall be entitled to any share in the assets of the Foundation, but all

assets shall immediately transfer absolutely to such institution or be spent for such cause as may be then determined by a majority of the members of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, except that the corpus of specifically designated gifts or bequests for the benefit or institutions, organizations, or associations shall be transferred to the designated institutions, organizations, or associations.

President's Report

"Now the LORD had said unto Abram, Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee:" Genesis 12:1

I served in the U.S. Army for 30 years. I continue to serve in the Mississippi State Guard and have for the last four years. The military intentionally moves soldiers to other units every couple of years, including commanders. In every unit in which I served whose commander was under orders to relocate, I observed great anxiety among unit personnel in regard to the incoming commander. Inquiries were made about the person's character. They wanted to know if anyone knew this soldier from another assignment and asked about the individual's personality. The questions and concerns went on and on.

I remember being interviewed for my first pastorate when I was in my midtwenties. While closing out the meeting the head deacon said, "remember preacher, pastors come and go but deacons are forever!" Well, that certainly raised my concern about my future ministry with them. As it turned out, the deacons and I had a great relationship during my tenure as their pastor and we had few friction moments. But the time came, and the Lord moved Linda and I on into the Army Chaplaincy. I look back now at that pastoral experience with fond memories of those deacons and church members.

Well, it's true in the Directorates of the BMA of Mississippi as well. Leaders of our departments come and go. In fact, I observe in the scriptures that very few of the Lord's servants were stationary. God often moved His people around. I vision that there was anxiety among the local believers regarding the replacement of their leaders. I think it's human nature. We get used to our leader's, or our pastor's, or our coworker's ways and thought processes and then things change. I think it's normal to be concerned about the possible changes in interpersonal dynamics or perhaps the philosophy of ministry that may come to an organization.

It was my experience in the military that rarely were there significant changes instituted by a new commander. And the changes that were introduced were based upon their current mission and approved by their own supervisors who provided oversight and guidance. It is also true of SBC. Having worked with Brother George Martinez for the last couple of months, he has greatly impressed me with his ability to assume the role as the next president of this great institution. If my opinion is worth anything, I highly encourage the messengers to vote in favor of his taking the reins of SBC. He has the unanimous support of our Board of Trustees and comes to this campus with a lifetime experience within the BMAA. I'll state it plainly; George Martinez has earned my trust as the right man for this job and I believe he is called by the Lord to lead SBC forward to greater heights in the work of the Kingdom.

Many have asked Linda and I what our future looks like. We are relocating to Huntsville, Alabama, where my daughter and four of our six grandchildren reside.

I intend, as they say in the Army, to "take a knee" for a few months as this job has been an exhausting eight-year non-stop run. I remain as the Endorsing Agent for BMAA chaplains and I will continue in my service representing the BMA to the Mississippi State Guard.

I will always cherish the many acquaintances and friendships Linda and I have developed over the years in Mississippi and I wish to thank the Lord for leading us to this great college. I am forever grateful for His guidance and gifts that He has bestowed upon this institution. And, to the churches of the BMA of Mississippi, thank you for the privilege to serve the Lord in the capacity of President. Linda and I will always treasure the time we spent at Southeastern Baptist College.

Southeastern Baptist College Trustees Meeting Minutes January 23, 2024

Chairman Pace commended Dr. Burch for the work he has accomplished and continues to accomplish around SBC finances.

Election of officers was next on the agenda. Following regular and established processes the following were elected: Chairman – Glen Pace, Vice Chairman – Sam Oglesby, Recording Secretary – Ceclia Broom, and Assistant Recording Secretary – Kenneth Pollock.

During Miscellaneous Business the Board was informed that the BMA of MS committee on salaries for department heads has approved up to a 5% increase in pay. A motion was presented that Dr. Carson's salary be increased by 5%. That motion received a second, and after discussion was approved.

The regular business meeting was suspended for a special closed session.

The regular business meeting was called back to order. There being no further business Dr. Kenneth Pollock closed the meeting with prayer. Meeting adjourned.

Southeastern Baptist College Trustees Meeting Minutes May 7, 2024

The meeting was called to order by the chairman. A devotion was given by Glen Pace from John 14 concerning, "Troublesome Times". The devotion was closed with prayer by Bro. Scott Kirkland.

The minutes from the previous meeting were read by Celia Broom. A motion and second was made to approve the minutes and carried.

The chairman introduced Bro. Skip Holland as a new member of the trustees and a warm welcome was given.

The Provost report was given concerning the new staff members at the time. They are: Brad Thompson and Dave Hook. Other members had not been confirmed at the time.

There was much excitement concerning the upcoming programs for aviation and agri-business. Progress is being made for these programs. The current enrollment for the Spring Semester is holding at 84, Summer at 21, and Fall at 44. Praying that the enrollment for these sessions will increase as the time for classes to convene approaches.

Recent events were reported as being successful and nice. Graduation was held May 4th and was a very exciting time for all. The Sports Banquet was successful and there were many awards given at the event. The Gospel Fest was a nice event and enjoyed by all, however there was not a successful profit from this event. The Golf Tournament and Gratitude Dinner is upcoming and we are hoping for successful events.

Closed Session

May 7, 2024

In a closed portion of the meeting the chairman and Dr. Carson brought to our attention the progress on the Thornton Estates and another family Estate contribution to the college. According to the financial report a discrepancy has been made concerning the spending of the Thornton Estate funds. Discussion was made regarding how to repay those funds in a timely manner. A motion and second was made to exhaust all other options before obtaining a loan from the Revolving Loan Fund and carried.

A motion and second was made to adjourn the meeting by Bro. Leon Carmichael and carried.

Southeastern Baptist College Trustees Meeting Minutes May 21, 2024

On May 21, 2024 during the Mid-Year Meeting of the BMA of Mississippi, a request was made for additional votes from the trustees to approve a loan from the Revolving Loan Fund. The vote passed unanimously with a quorum assembled.

Southeastern Baptist College Trustees Meeting Minutes June 5, 2024

On June 5, 2024 the Board of Trustees voted by email to approve the Summer Semester Professors.

Southeastern Baptist College Trustees Special Called Meeting Minutes June 25, 2024

The meeting was called for the purpose of interviewing the candidate recommended by the search committee for the presidency of Southeastern Baptist College.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Glen Pace. The opening prayer was led by Bro. Sidney Davis. The devotional was presented by Bro. Don Robinson, speaking from Judges 6 on the topic: "What is the Lord's Will."

Before the interview began, the trustees were briefed by President Carson and the chairman of the board on the present financial state of the college.

Bro. George Martinez, with his family, was introduced to the assembled trustees. After Bro. Martinez and each family member present had briefly spoken, the family members were dismissed. Bro Martinez remained to present his testimony and to answer questions from the board. When the questioning was completed Bro. Martinez left the meeting.

Bro. Leon Carmical led the trustees in a special prayer seeking divine guidance in the deliberations to follow.

SBC Provost Anderle Foster joined the trustees to briefly state her perception of Bro. Martinez and his family. The focus of the assessment given was relative to his perceived ability to fit in and work with the staff leading the college forward. After Mrs. Foster departed, the trustees continued their deliberations leading to the following motion: "To extend the offer to Bro. Martinez to come aboard with the title of Interim President/Dean of Student Affairs with the beginning salary of \$40,000 plus insurance and moving expenses paid.

The motion received a second, the vote was taken, and the motion passed.

Dr. Carson was brought back into the meeting and informed of the trustee's action. The discussion turned to the details of how the transition would proceed should Bro. Martinez accept the offer presented. Basically, Dr. Carson would be shadowed by Bro. Martinez for a time before progressively assuming responsibilities until he became the lead and Dr. Carson became the shadow. Bro. Martinez's pay would increase, and Dr. Carson's would decrease until Bro. Martinez's salary reached the level set by the BMA of Mississippi and Dr. Carson would be retired. A special prayer was offered for Dr. Carson and appreciations extended for the work he has accomplished for SBC and his willingness to delay retirement until the new President is fully in place.

Bro. Martinez was asked to return to the boardroom where he was presented the offer with an explanation of how the transition would take place. He stated that he would inform the chairman of trustees of his decision by Monday following the present meeting.

A special prayer was spoken for Bro. Martinez and his family concerning their decision-making process and for their travel safety as they returned to their home in Texas.

Their being no further business, after the closing prayer, the meeting adjourned.

The Provost began the report with the introduction of new faculty and staff. A motion and second was made to approve the list of faculty and staff for 2024-2025 and it carried.

Discussion was made concerning the contracts and how they were changed due to Mississippi Labor Laws and we viewed the new contract copy.

An update on the enrollment was given and is at 90 with a possibility of a few more with the next couple of weeks.

Independent Auditor's Report

Opinion

Notes to financial statements June 30, 2024

Note 1 - Description of the Organization

Southeastern Baptist College ("The College") is located in Laurel, Mississippi and provides quality post-secondary education from a biblical worldview in a Christian atmosphere. The College is owned and operated by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and is overseen by a Board of Trustees. It is supported by contributions from churches that are members of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, contributions from foundations and individuals, and student tuition and other fees. The college receives Federal Financial Aid from the Pell Grant Program of the U.S. Department of Education.

In 2018, the College began an expansion of its curricula to include athletics, including basketball, baseball, and golf. The athletic programs operate in Division TI of the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA), which is an association of Christ-centered collegiate institutions whose mission is to use athletic competition as an integral component of education, evangelism, and encouragement.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors, and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the College or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, where by the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity.

Donor restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets are reclassified from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions in the statements of activities.

Measure of operations – The statements of activities reports all changes in net assets, including changes in net assets from operating and nonoperating activities. Operating activities consist of those items attributable to the College's ongoing educational services and interest and dividends earned on investments. Nonoperating activities are limited to resources that generate return from investments and other activities considered to be of a more unusual or nonrecurring nature.

Cash and cash equivalents – the College's cash consists of cash on deposit with banks. Cash equivalents represent money market funds or short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of purchase, except for those amounts that are held in the investment portfolio which are invested for long-term purposes.

Concentrations of credit risk – Financial instruments that potentially subject the College to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash and cash equivalents and investments. The College maintains its cash and cash equivalents in various bank accounts that, at times, may exceed federally insured limits, the College's cash and cash equivalent accounts have been placed with high credit quality financial institutions. The College has not experienced, nor does it anticipate, any losses with respect to such accounts.

Notes to financial statements June 30, 2024

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Contributions receivable – Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-adjusted interest rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Discount amortization is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are met

Property and equipment, net – Property and equipment are stated at cost at the date of purchase or, for donated assets, at fair value at the date of donation, less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method over the lesser of the estimated useful lives of the assets or the lease term. The useful lives range from 5 to 40 years, the College's policy is to capitalize renewals and betterments acquired for greater than \$500 and expense normal repairs and maintenance as incurred, the College's management periodically evaluates whether events or circumstances have occurred indicating that the carrying amount of long-lived assets may not be recovered.

Investments – Investments are reported at cost, if purchased, or at fair value, if donated. Thereafter, investments are reported at their fair values in the statements of financial position, and changes in fair value are reported as investment return in the statements of activities.

Purchases and sales of securities are reflected on a trade-date basis. Gains and losses on sales of securities are based on average cost and are recorded in the statements of activities in the period in which the securities are sold. Interest is recorded when earned. Dividends are accrued as of the ex-dividend date.

Contributions — Contributions received are recorded as not assets without donor restrictions or not assets with donor restrictions, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor-imposed restrictions. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as an increase in not assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the contribution is recognized. All other donor restricted contributions are reported as an increase in net assets with donor restriction, depending on the nature of restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), not assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as not assets released from restrictions.

Contributed property and equipment are recorded at fair value at the date of donation. Contributions with donorimposed stipulations regarding how long the contributed assets must be used are recorded as net assets with donor restrictions; otherwise, the contributions are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions. The College received no donated goods for the year ended June 30, 2024.

Notes to financial statements June 30, 2024

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with US GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Credit Losses – The College provides on-site and off-site educational programs to a broad range of students. It has tracked historical loss information for accounts receivable and compiled historical credit loss percentages for different aging categories and believes that the historical loss information compiled is a reasonable base on which to determine expected credit losses for accounts receivable held at June 30, 2024 because the composition of the accounts receivable at that date is consistent with that used in developing the historical credit-loss percentages (i.e., the similar risk characteristics of its students and its practices have not changed significantly over time).

Income taxes – the College is exempt from income tax under IRC section 501(c)(3), though it is subject to tax on income unrelated to its exempt purpose, unless that income is otherwise excluded by the Code. The College has processes presently in place to ensure the maintenance of its tax-exempt status; to identify and report unrelated income; to determine its filing and tax obligations in jurisdictions for which it has nexus; and to identify and evaluate other matters that may be considered tax positions. The College has determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions that require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

Functional expenses – The costs of providing program and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among educational services and supporting services benefited. Such allocations are determined by management on an equitable basis.

The expenses that are allocated include the following:

Note 5 - Leases

The College has a lease with an unrelated party for equipment. This lease is for a term of less than 12 months. The College has elected the short-term exemption with respect to this contract.

If, in future years, the College incurs leases/contracts that meet the criteria for reporting under ASC 842, an asset – "Right of Use Assets – Operating leases" (operating leases) and/or additions to "Property, Plant & Equipment" (financing leases) and a corresponding liability – "Lease Liability" will be shown on the Statement of Financial Position.

Note 6 - Notes Payable

Short-term debt at June 30, 2024 consists of a note payable to Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in the amount of \$450,000 dated June 27, 2024 with \$355,315 was advanced to the College. All advances on this note are to be repaid on March 27, 2025. Interest at the rate of 7% is due quarterly.

Note 7 - Tuition and Fees

Note 8 - Revenue Recognition

The College recognizes revenue from student tuition and fees during the year in which the related services are provided to students. The performance obligation of delivering educational services is simultaneously received and consumed by the students; therefore, the revenue is recognized ratably over the course of the academic year. Payment for tuition and fees is generally invoiced at the beginning of each term and payment is required no later than the specified add/drop date. All amounts received prior to the commencement of the academic year, including enrollment deposits, are deferred to the applicable period. Scholarships provided to students are recorded as a reduction from the posted tuition rates at the time revenue is recognized.

Note 9 - Commitments and Contingencies

The College is subject to certain claims arising out of the ordinary course of business. Potentially, this includes amounts reimbursed through the U. S. Department of Education via the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund. Although it is not possible to predict the outcome of all claims, management believes they have properly recorded liabilities for any outcomes where the liability can by reasonably measured and has not recorded liabilities for any claims which will not have a material effect on the financial condition of the College.

Note 10 - Related Party Transactions

There were no significant or unusual transactions with related parties in accordance with AU-C section 550 nor were there reportable transactions under SFAS 57 for the years ended June 30, 2024. Transactions with members of management, board members, or their family members included amounts paid for reasonable compensation and/or reimbursed expenses under an accountable reimbursement plan. Please see Supplemental Schedule C for more information.

Note 11 - Subsequent Events

The College has evaluated subsequent events through December 2, 2024, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, the College is not aware of any material subsequent events.

Youth Department By-Laws

Article I — Name

Section 1: This Department shall be known as the Department of Youth.

Article II — Purpose

Section 1: The Purpose of this Department shall be to present Jesus Christ when the opportunity presents itself as the only way of salvation and the best life.

Section 2: To help coordinate all youth work in the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 3: To encourage and promote youth organizations and activities among the churches that compose the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 4: To cooperate with all other Departments of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, to work with Youth groups in our churches and in local Associations and in the Baptist Missionary Association of America in preaching the Gospel of Christ around the world.

Section 5: To promote Youth Encampments within the ranks of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and the Baptist Missionary Association of America.

Section 6: To promote the work of the Association of Baptist Students; to work with and assist them in their activities.

Article III — Youth Trustees

Section 1: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect nine trustees to serve 3 year terms on a staggered basis, three being elected each year.

Section 2: The State Senior Encampment shall be permitted to recommend one trustee whose name shall stand as a nomination at the Annual meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 3: The Association of Baptist Students shall be permitted one trustee whose name shall stand as a nomination at the meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 4: The nominating committee shall nominate one trustees at the Annual Session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 5: Duties of Youth Trustees:

- 1. To act in council with the Director of the Youth Department in matters that concern this Department.
- 2. To bring before the Association recommendations which they feel are in the best interest of the work of youth.
 - 3. To serve as trustees of the State Senior Youth Encampment.
 - 4. To lead in, and work with, the area Junior Youth Encampment.
- 5. To plan and promote a State Wide Teen Conference each year. The Conference is to be held during the week after Christmas Day.

Article IV — Director

Section 1: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a Director of Youth.

Section 2: Duties:

- 1. The Director shall serve as the Director of the Youth Department.
- 2. The Director shall carry out the plans and programs voted by the Association as they relate to this Department.

- 3. The Director shall serve as Treasurer and shall receive and disburse all funds as designated.
- 4. The Director shall assume general supervision of the Youth Department of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- 5. The Director shall maintain necessary records and is authorized to purchase equipment and supplies as they may be needed to carry on the work of this Department.
- 6. The Director is authorized to promote the work of Youth among the churches in any manner consistent with the principles of this Association.
- 7. The Director shall work with the Trustees of the Youth Department in carrying out the will of the churches of this Association.

By-Laws of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Department of Missions (Revised and Approved 2024)

Article I - Name

This department shall be known as the Department of Missions.

Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this department shall be to preach the Gospel of Christ, to establish and equip churches, and to be a resource for strengthening and stabilizing churches. This includes:

Promoting this purpose among the churches that compose the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, and Cooperating and working with other departments of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, local associations, other state associations, and the Baptist Missionary Association of America in the preaching of the Gospel in all the world.

Article III - Missionary Committee

Section 1: Members

The messengers of the churches shall elect nine (9) committeemen, five of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said committeemen shall be elected to serve for a period of three (3) years on a staggered basis, one third being elected each year.

Section 2: Duties

The Committee shall, in the event of a vacancy in the position of Director of Missions, refer to Article IX, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and follow the guidelines presented there.

The Committee shall act in collaboration with the Director of Missions in matters that concern this department.

The Committee shall act in collaboration with the Director of Missions concerning missionary personnel when necessary.

The Committee shall counsel, along with the Director of Missions, local mission churches, assisting missionaries in their service to the mission and to the state association.

The Committee shall investigate and bring before the association recommendations which it feels is in the best interest of the work of missions.

The Committee shall seek out qualified and available personnel to serve as missionaries and be authorized to place them on the field between sessions (to be approved at the next meeting of the association), provided all qualifications have been met according to Article V - i.e., no extenuating circumstances.

The Committee shall investigate the qualifications of each prospective missionary.

The Committee shall examine the salary schedule of the department annually.

The Committee shall investigate when a missionary's work becomes unsatisfactory, if his doctrinal beliefs are in question, or if his moral character or that of his immediate family (who are living with him) becomes contrary to Biblical standards. If found to be unsatisfactory, upon the recommendation of the Committee, the salary of said missionary shall be withheld until the next meeting of the association for approval.

The Committee shall provide, upon the resignation of any missionary, a salary of up to three weeks following his resignation.

No committee member shall be given as a reference by anyone applying for missionary status.

Article IV - Director of Missions and Revolving Loan Fund

Section 1: Election

The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a Director of Missions and Revolving Loan Fund.

Section 2: Salary

The Director shall receive such compensation as may be designated by the Association.

Section 3: Offices

The Director's office (and additional spaces for personnel/operations, as needed) shall be maintained at such places as may be designated by the Association.

Section 4: Vacation and Revivals

The Director shall be allowed two weeks paid vacation per year and shall be permitted to retain the proceeds from five revivals each year.

Section 5: Duties

The Director shall serve as Executive Director of the Missions Department, to execute the programs and plans voted by the Association.

The Director shall serve as treasurer of the General Fund and shall receive and disburse all funds as designated.

The Director shall assume general supervision of the Missions and Revolving Loan Fund Department.

The Director shall maintain necessary records, purchase equipment and supplies, and employ such help as authorized by the Missionary Committee to fulfill this responsibility according to accepted standards.

The Director shall work with each missionary in the selection of a field of work, location, organization, building, and financing.

The Director is authorized to promote the work of missions among the churches in any manner consistent with the principles of this Association.

The Director shall work with all committees of the Missions Department in carrying out the will of the churches of this association.

The Director, with the advice and counsel of the Missionary Committee, is authorized to withhold payment of monies which would, in their opinion, affect the welfare of the institution. This action would be subject to the approval of the Association at the next meeting.

The Director shall give reports at each meeting and shall give a detailed report in the annual session of this Association and shall present a proposed plan of work and a proposed budget for the ensuing year.

The Director shall plan missions and evangelistic conferences (dates, locations, and programs).

Article V - Missionaries

Section 1: Employment Needs

This Association shall employ missionaries as the Spirit of God may direct.

Section 2: Guidelines for State Missionary Status

The applicant must have a minimum of two years pastoral experience in a BMAA church(es). Even though the applicant may not be pastoring at the present

time, his previous two years' membership shall have been in a BMAA church(es).

The applicant must meet Biblical qualifications as stated in I Timothy 3:1-7.

The applicant must express a burden for a specific field of service.

The applicant must demonstrate an attitude of loyalty and cooperation with the departments of our associated work.

The applicant must understand that measurable growth toward self-support status is expected by the Association.

Section 3: Process for State Missionary Employment

A prospective missionary must fill out the required questionnaire, and it must be in the Missions Office at least fifteen (15) days prior to being considered by the Missionary Committee.

A prospective missionary must present to the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee two (2) recommendations: one from the church where they currently hold membership and one from the last church pastored.

A prospective missionary must be approved by the Missionary Committee before being considered for missionary status. This entails a thorough vetting process, with verification of all recommendations and confirmation that the prospective missionary meets all guidelines for missionary status (Section 2).

Any extenuating circumstances deviating from Section 2 or Section 3 of this Article may be considered; however, they must be resolved to the satisfaction of the Missionary Committee prior to endorsement by the Association.

In the event any of the guidelines of Section 2 or the process of Section 3 cannot be met properly by the prospective missionary, his missionary status will be delayed until the next meeting for Association action. Although vetted and then approved by the Missionary Committee, final approval and endorsement of a prospective missionary must be obtained from the Association.

Section 4: Duties

A missionary is required to counsel with the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee in all matters that shall affect a change in location, finance, etc. of his mission endeavor.

A missionary is to notify the Missions Office when he is to be absent from his mission.

A missionary shall render monthly statistical and financial reports to the Director of Missions.

A missionary shall give reports to the Association when called upon to do so.

Section 5: Benefits

A missionary who becomes ill or disabled shall receive full pay for a period of three months. Conditions extending past this period will be reviewed and presented at the next Association meeting.

A missionary shall be allowed two weeks paid vacation, and he shall be permitted five (5) revivals per year (retaining the proceeds). He shall not have two (2) revivals in succession or be out of the mission's pulpit on Sunday mornings more than two (2) Sundays a year.

A missionary's moving expenses shall be paid when moving upon the field or when changing fields. Up to \$150.00 in miscellaneous expenses is also authorized in a change of fields.

Article VI - Cooperation

Section 1: The State Mission's Department is authorized to cooperate with churches and local associations of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi

in mission endeavors when approved by the Director of Missions and the Missionary Committee. It is also authorized to cooperate with other state associations and the national association in mission endeavors when approved by the Association in either annual or other sessions.

Section 2: Missionaries under the above joint sponsorships must meet the qualifications and requirements of the State Mission's Department.

Section 3: Guidelines For Cooperation

When a church or an association desires to cooperate with the State Mission's Department in a mission project, they shall counsel with the Director of Missions before interviewing and electing a missionary. Likewise, the State Missions Department shall counsel with the local church and/or local association before electing a missionary to work in a joint project.

When an association or church is impressed with a preacher for missionary status, they shall request the Missionary Committee of the State Association to meet with them and interview the said preacher before electing him.

If approved by the joint committees, he shall be recommended back to the association or church that requested the interview for final approval.

Article VII - Mission Congregations

Section 1: Missionary Pastor Support

A mission church shall be required to begin pastoral support starting after the first three (3) months of its beginning. The initial amount of support will not be less than ten percent (10%) of the average monthly income. The projected income and expenses of the mission church shall be used as a criteria in establishing the rate of monthly increase. Other instructions may be given to the Director of Missions and Missionary Committee by the messenger body in any session, called or regular.

Section 2: Administration

Prior to organization, any and all banking of a mission church must be conducted with the Revolving Loan Fund to ensure complete and proper oversight of the mission church's financial activities.

Section 3: Organization

The Mission congregation shall be required to counsel with both the Director of Missions, the Missionary Committee, and its mother church before organizing into a church.

Article VIII - Services Provided for Established Churches

Because of a sincere desire to minister to our established churches, the Missions Department has the ability to assess the needs of associational churches and to propose ministries that will effectively strengthen those churches. These ministries shall be available for the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 1: Available Ministers List

A list will be maintained for ministers available for occasional fil-in or pastoring. Ministers on this list must be presently holding membership in a BMAA church.

Churches may contact the Missions Office for this list. Names on the list are not recommendations; therefore, churches are encouraged to do their own investigation.

Section 2: Guidelines for Establishing Ministries

A potential ministry program shall be presented, explained, and adopted by the Missionary Committee before it can be implemented.

A ministry program, adopted by the Missionary Committee, shall be presented, discussed, and adopted by the Association at an annual or mid-year meeting before funding of the ministry program can be established.

An Established Ministry program shall be reviewed and assessed by the Missionary Committee on a regular basis to determine the effectiveness and financial ability of the Missions Department to support that ministry program.

The availability of any ministry program(s) shall be limited by the financial stability of the Missions Department budget. The first priority of the Missions Department is the care and provision of its missionaries and its mission churches. Therefore, the availability to offer a ministry program(s) will be subject to the first priority of the Missions Department being accomplished.

Any hired personnel for a ministry program shall be approved by the Missionary Committee.

Section 3: Available Ministries

<u>Revitalize</u>. This ministry exists to assist churches in assessment and providing resources to facilitate a process of revitalization within the church. This ministry offers three levels of partnerships: Refocus, Revitalize, and Replant.

<u>Timothy Apprenticeship</u>. This ministry exists to help equip preachers who are new in the ministry, yet who have expressed a desire to either pastor or plant churches but feel inadequately prepared for the task. This apprenticeship is a two-year process that teaches, equips, and provides hands-on, real-world application and training for those involved.

<u>Summer Internship</u>. This ministry exists to provide an opportunity for young men who feel the calling to the ministry to test the waters of pastoral ministry. The internship provides opportunities for its participants to serve alongside a senior pastor and get introduced to all facets and applications of pastoral ministry.

By-Laws of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Revolving Loan Fund

Article I — Trustees

Section A. The election and tenure of office of trustees:

The messengers of the churches shall elect nine (9) Trustees, five (5) of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Trustees shall be elected to serve for a period of three (3) years on a staggered basis, 1/3 being elected each year. By virtue of the office, the Director and Manager of the Revolving Loan Fund of the State Missions Department will be ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees.

Section B. Duties of Trustees:

The duties of the Trustees of the Revolving Loan Fund shall be:

- 1. To promote the general welfare of the financial interest of fund.
- 2. To thoroughly investigate all loan applications relative to the value of the proposed building site; the desirability of the proposed location with reference to growth possibilities; and the financial ability of the petitioners for the proposed loan.
- 3. To serve as trust officers of all loan papers; including deeds of trust and/or promissory notes or any other transactions pertinent to a loan or its security; of all loans processed.
- 4. To investigate and purchase property for future mission sites and to serve as trust officers of all properties of the Mission's Department acquired by purchase, repossession, or gifts.
 - 5. To serve as a collecting agent of all loans processed.
- 6. To see that all transactions are carried out in keeping with good legal and bookkeeping procedures.
 - 7. To secure any office or legal help needed.
- 8. The Trustees shall be authorized to negotiate a loan for a qualified applicant when funds are not available in the loan fund. In such an event the Trustees are authorized to pledge real and personal property owned by the Mission's Department of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi for the security of the loan.
- 9. The Trustees shall be empowered to sell and dispose of any real or personal property entrusted to them only when there is a majority vote of the Trustees and the approval of the Association at any regular committee meeting
- 10. The Trustees shall be authorized to include the names of the Church Trustees with the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees on the warranty deed for the church property to secure permanent financing. If only the names of the Church Trustees are required, the deed will include a revertible clause placing the property back in the name of the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees should the church cease to affiliate with the Association.

Article II — Manager Of The Revolving Loan Fund

Section A.

1. The Manager of the Revolving Loan Fund shall be selected by the Director and the Revolving Loan Fund trustees.

Section B. Duties

1. The Manager of the Revolving Loan Fund shall receive such compensations and benefits as shall be designated by the Director and the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees.

- 2. He will be responsible for receiving and disbursing funds according to the directions of the Director and the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees.
- 3. He will receive the payments from the loans and supervise the keeping of the records pertaining to each loan.
 - 4. He will serve as Promotional Director of the Revolving Loan Fund.
- 5. He shall serve as reporter for the Revolving Loan Fund at each committee meeting and give a detailed report at the annual session of the Association.

Article III — Source Of Funds

Section A. The churches, with their various auxiliary organizations, are requested to place the Revolving Loan Fund in their budgets.

Section B. Individuals are urged to remember the Loan Fund with trust funds and gifts in their wills.

Section C. The Trustees are authorized to borrow money from commercial lending institutions for qualified applicants in the event funds are not available in the treasury (Article I. Section B, Paragraph 8).

Section D. The Trustees are authorized to borrow money from Churches, Associations and individuals for the purpose of financing mission projects and pay interest on this borrowed money, not to exceed the current rate of interest paid by banks.

Section E. The Manager of the Revolving Loan Fund shall be authorized to borrow money against Certificates of Deposits that the Revolving Loan Fund has on deposit, when needed.

Article IV — Loans

Section A. Processing loans.

- 1. Eligibility For Loans
- a. A church or department requesting the loan shall be a member of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, one of her affiliate local associations, or one of the state associations or departments cooperating with the Baptist Missionary Association of America, or shall have voted to seek membership in the above mentioned association, or shall be a church of like faith and order (Baptist) in Mississippi as a secondary priority loan of available money.
- b. Properties owned by the Revolving Loan Fund of the BMA of Mississippi may be sold to other denominations, individuals, or businesses. If it is necessary for the Revolving Loan Fund to finance any project for religious uses by non-Baptist entities, it will be brought back to the next meeting of the Association for their decision.
- c. The Revolving Loan Fund may grant loans to investors against savings up to 80% of their balance until loan is paid. Loans shall be at the current variable interest rate. Loans to employees shall be submitted to the Revolving Loan Trustees for approval.
- 2. Churches organized by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Missions Department shall be given priority in the processing of loans.
- 3. Other churches making application for loans will be considered on the basis of their merits and in keeping with the procedure in which loans are granted the churches organized by the Missions Department.
- 4. In the event a proposed mission field is to receive a loan for the purchase of a site, the Revolving Loan Trustees shall investigate the proposed site and proceed in keeping with other loans. The purchased property and its improvements shall secure a first mortgage held by the Revolving Loan Fund, or the loan shall be secured

otherwise.

- 5. Each loan applicant is urged to make a commercial loan as soon as the first unit is constructed and the church can conveniently do so whereby the funds of the Revolving Loan Fund can be made available to other worthy applicants.
- 6. When sufficient funds are available, the Revolving Loan Fund will provide permanent financing for mission projects. The schedule of payments will be provided by a professional accountant based on a term contract and an interest rate determined by the trustees.
 - 7. The Trustees shall require adequate security for each loan.
- 8. All applicants for loans shall furnish adequate insurance on all buildings financed through the Revolving Loan Fund. The Revolving Loan Fund shall be made the lienholder on the policy. The insurance company shall be requested to notify the Revolving Loan Fund the date the policy coverage begins and ends.

Section B. Repayment of loans.

- 1. Each applicant shall pay the payments which have been worked out in a schedule by the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees.
- 2. If the lenders should withdraw their money unexpectedly from the Revolving Loan Fund, or should an emergency arise that results in a need for funds in the Revolving Loan Fund, each applicant must agree to secure a commercial loan as soon as possible and pay the Revolving Loan Fund in full.
- 3. In the event the Church becomes unable to meet the scheduled payments, she will notify the Manager of the Loan Fund who can call the Trustees together to determine whether the payments can be lowered or what procedure is necessary for the good of the church and the protection of the Revolving Loan Fund.
- 4. The Revolving Loan Fund will help the mission churches with monthly subsidies when sufficient funds are available. The amount of each subsidy will be determined by considering the size of the mortgage payment and the financial condition of each mission church. The amount of the subsidies given to the various mission churches will be reevaluated prior to each regular associational meeting.

Article V

Financial Retirement And Releasing Of Mission Church— Established Church Property

Section A. Mission Properties and Buildings

1. Debt Retirement:

The capital indebtedness of the mission church may be discharged through either of or a combination of the following:

- a. Payments made by the local congregation.
- b. Unrestricted payments: Those made in behalf of the mission by an person/s, other church/es or an association/s which do not go through the Mission office.
- c. Restricted payments: Those made in behalf of the mission by person/s, other church/es, or an association/s made through the Mission office.
- d. Suspension payments: Monies/payments suspended by the Revolving Loan Fund.
 - e. Forgiven payments: The forgiveness of debt by the Revolving Loan Fund.
 - 2. Title Holding:

The Revolving Loan Fund Trustees shall hold the title of any Mission Church property for any financial amount/s of indebtedness due under the following provisions:

a. Any unpaid accounts with the missions office.

- b. Any unpaid restricted or suspended payments made toward the retirement of the said church's indebtedness of properties, buildings or other capital improvements.
 - c. For security reasons.
 - 3. Title Release:

The Revolving Loan Fund Trustees of the BMA of Mississippi shall release any mission church property of which the Revolving Loan Fund Trustees of the BMA of Mississippi holds title or joint title providing:

- a. The indebtedness of the said mission church has been paid.
- b. The said mission church from her organization date has contributed to the associational work of the BMA of Mississippi an amount equal to that which was contributed to her debt retirement through restricted and suspended payments. The responsibility of proof for such contributions lies with the mission church.

Section B: Established Church Properties and Buildings

- 1. Receiving Title of Properties and Buildings
- a. A letter of request from the church stating that in a regular business meeting at least two-thirds of the church members who were present voted to request the BMA of Mississippi Revolving Loan Fund Trustees to hold their church property title. The vote shall take place after it has been announced and publicized in writing for at least thirty days prior to the voting.
 - b. The request must bear the signatures of the church pastor, clerk, and trustees.
- c. The Association shall not be responsible for any upkeep on property, buildings, equipments, payment of insurances, building or personal liability claim/s that may incur.
 - 2. Releasing Title of Properties and Buildings

Any such property/properties received by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi under the agreement as mentioned under Article V, Section B, shall be released back to the church subject to the following terms/conditions.

- a. A letter of request from the church stating that in a regular business meeting at least two-thirds of the church members who were present voted to request the release of their church property title. The vote shall take place after it has been announced and publicized in writing for at least thirty days prior to the voting.
 - b. The request must bear the signatures of the church pastor, clerk, and trustees.
 - c. This request shall be made three months in advance of the release.
- d. Such property shall be released after any financial obligations to the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi has been settled.

Missions Department Annual Meeting Report October 2024

What you saw in those videos are just a small sampling of what the Lord is doing through the different endeavors of your missions department! Over this past year, God has done miraculous things.

In missions, about 30 souls have been saved, and roughly that many baptized, each mission has doubled or more than doubled in attendance, 1 of our missions have organized, and another will be organizing in December, and our missionaries are executing at a high level.

In coaching: The Lord has blessed mightily. We have been able to witness the effectiveness of our coaching in the ministries of our missionaries and the pastors that have taken advantage of the opportunity. We have had pastors and missionaries

go through our evangelism, discipleship and our preaching coaching this past year. We have also added on this past year a mentoring side to our coaching. This initiative is to link our younger missionaries/pastors with our seasoned men of God. This mentoring process allows our older pastors to train in a certain doctrine as well as connect personally with the younger pastor.

In Revitalize: God has so graciously allowed us to get this ministry full kicked off this year with our first church: First Baptist Shady Grove, and the results have been what only God can do. We are excited for what the Lord is doing in this church! We were also blessed to have another incredible Acts 1:8 conference. We had over 30 churches represented at the North/South conferences, grew in attendance, and saw God work mightily in hearts.

In Timothy Ministries: The Lord has blessed us with our first Timothy who began his training this past September. It is a joy to watch his growth as he is poured into with coaching, mentoring, and ministry!

With all that has been initiated, I do not believe that God is done! Not at all! I believe that the Lord is just starting, and fully intendeds to continue to do great things in a through the BMA of Mississippi.

My vision for this next year is from Galatians 6:9... "and let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

The Lord has been so good to get these ministries of the ground while still doing a great work in our mission endeavors. Because of this, I trust that this next year, by His grace, will be even greater!

Pray with us that God will do these things this year:

Bring on 2 new missionaries to plant a church in Mississippi (Bro. Oscar from Guatemala prayerfully will be here in the first of the year)

Bring on 2 more Revitalize churches

Bring on 1 to 2 more Timothies to begin training for the ministry

That we will be able to connect with every pastor/church in our Association building a deeper trust to work together for the cause of the Great Commission

To Accomplish these goals, we are going to need our associational churches to buy into the work of missions, revitalize, and timothy ministries. Associational giving consists of roughly 60% of what we are doing. We can sustain this reality for about another year. After that, we would have to begin "limiting" the amount of work we could do in the realms of revitalize and Timothy ministries. Would you and your church pray with us about giving to missions, revitalize, and Timothy ministries specifically. To make revitalize self sustaining over the next year, we would need about 50,000.00 a year. For Timothy ministries to be self sustaining over the next year, it would take about 60,000. Like giving to missions, what is given to these ministries, goes to these ministries.

Revolving Loan Fund Report

The Lord again, has been so good to us in the RLF. Over the last year, he has grown this fund by almost 2 million, and over the last two years, by 4 million. Our fund sits today at over 27 million dollars in investments. By the end of this month, 20+ million will have been distributed in loans, and there is over 4+ million more being requested in this next year. God has been so good, and we praise Him for what He is doing. The Lord is using this fund to aid churches and missions in physical growth so that they can effectively reach their community with the gospel of Jesus Christ. Many of our missionaries and churches, could not be doing what they are doing without the ministry of the RLF. Come invest in eternity with us!

This past February we had our first audit that covered the transition and my first year (roughly 17 months), and by God's grace, we were able to receive the highest response available: an unmodified opinion. Even in a year of transition and learning, God blessed to make sure everything was done effectively.

Please pray with us, our goal for this year is to see the fund reach 30 million of investments, with the right balance of loans going out.

Some of our further goals, is to continue to help our churches and pastors in the realm of insurance. We are still working to understanding if/how we can offer property insurance. We are still pursuing that goal. In the realm of medical insurance, we have partnered with the Hinton Insurance agency, and they are committed to helping our BMA Pastor get medical insurance as affordable as possible. Please connect with our new WMA President Bethany Hinton about how they help you and your church with medical insurance.

Lastly, We are sponsoring a mission trip February 1-8th in Guatemala (construction and evangelism). If you would like to participate and come with us; the cost is 1000.00. If you would like to donate to the cost, we would be honored.



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Missions and Revolving Loan Fund Departments (the "Association") which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related statement of changes in net assets and cash flows for the year ended December 31, 2023 and the related notes to the financial statements.

Basis for Opinion

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Association's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and, therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Note 1. Nature of Activity and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activity

Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Missions and Revolving Loan Fund Departments (the "Association") is a nonprofit religious organization composed of Baptist Missionary Association ("BMA") member churches of Mississippi. Baptist Missionary Association of Missississippi Missions Department was organized for the purpose of performing mission work on a cooperative basis. The Revolving Loan Fund Department was organized for the purpose of lending funds to the BMA churches:

A summary of the Association's significant accounting policies follows:

Basis of Preparation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Concentration Risk

The Association has a high concentration of liabilities in short-term notes. The notes payable to investors were approximately \$20,150,000 at December 31, 2023 and are either payable upon demand or rate-locked for periods of 9, 12, 18 or 24 months. If unusual conditions should restrict liquidity, the notes payable will be available on a weighted share average. These liabilities provided funding for 100 percent of the Association's loans receivable. The risk of a sudden demand from investors for payments on these notes would have a severe adverse effect on the Association's operations. Management has increased the liquidity position of the Association in recent years to better mitigate this risk. At December 31, 2023, the Association had approximately \$7,140,000 in nonrestricted liquid assets, consisting primarily of cash and cash equivalents and trading securities.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of reporting cash flows, the Association considers all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Trading Investments

Investments in equity securities and fixed income with readily determinable market values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the financial statements, Investment income or loss, including realized and unrealized gains and losses, interest and dividends, is included in unrestricted net assets.

Loans Receivable

Loans receivables are stated at the amount of unpaid principal, less an allowance for credit losses. The allowance for credit losses is increased through a provision for credit losses charged to income, and decreased by charge-offs, net of recoveries, when management determines that collectability of all amounts when due is unlikely. The allowance is based on management's estimate of the amount necessary to absorb losses on existing loans. Management's estimate is based on a review of specific loans, estimated fair value of any underlying collateral and current economic conditions that may affect the borrower's ability to repay. Loans are separately evaluated for collectability when management determines that it is probable that principal on those loans will not be collected according to their contractual terms. At December 31, 2023 and 2022, management had allowances for credit losses totaling \$347.083. Interest is accrued daily on the outstanding balances. The Association had loans receivable over 90 days or more past due of \$167,897 at December 31, 2023, as compared to \$360,038 at December 31, 2022.

Allowance for Credit Losses

The Association operates as a not-for-profit financial institution and its accounts receivables are primarily derived from loans provided to Baptist Missionary Association members and member churches. At each balance sheet date, the company recognizes an expected allowance for credit losses. In addition, also at each reporting date, this estimate is updated to reflect any changes in credit risk since the receivable was initially reported. This estimate is calculated on a pooled basis where similar risk characteristics exist. Loans are evaluated individually when they do not share similar risk characteristics which could exist in circumstances where amounts are considered at risk or uncollectible.

The allowance estimate is derived from a review of the Association's historical losses based on the aging of loans. This estimate is adjusted for management's assessment of current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts regarding future events, and any other factors deemed relevant by the Association. The Association believes historical loss information is a reasonable starting point in which to calculate the expected allowance for the credit losses as the Association's loan portfolio has remained constant since the Association's inception. The Association is not anticipating higher or lower than expected credit losses than have been incurred in the past. As a result, management has determined that its allowance for credit losses should remain constant.

The allowance for credit losses was \$347,083 for the year ended December 31, 2023.

The Association writes off receivables when there is information that indicates the debtor is facing significant financial difficulty and there is no possibility of recovery. If any recoveries are made from any accounts previously written off, they will be recognized in income or an offset to credit loss expense in the year of recovery, in accordance with the Association's accounting policy election. The total amount of write-offs was immaterial to the financial statements as a whole for the year ended December 31, 2023.

Property Held for Sale

Property acquired through foreclosure or by voluntary return of the property is initially recorded at fair value. Subsequent to foreclosure or voluntary return, the property is measured at the lower of cost or estimated fair value. Property is evaluated regularly to ensure the recorded amount is supported by its current fair value. Valuation allowances to reduce the carrying amount to fair value less costs to dispose are recorded, as necessary.

Property, Equipment and Depreciation

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost if purchased or at fair value at the date of the gift, if donated. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight line method.

Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash or other assets to the Association are recorded at fair value on the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give are recorded at fair value at the date the promise becomes unconditional. Gifts of cash and other assets without donor stipulations are reported as revenue and net assets without donor restrictions. Gifts of cash and other assets received with a donor stipulation that limits their use are reported as revenue and net assets with donor restrictions. When a donor-stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of changes in net assets as released from donor restrictions. Contributions whose restrictions are met in the same reporting period are recorded as revenue and net assets without donor restrictions.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings and equipment are reported as revenue and net assets without donor restrictions, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit donor restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long lived assets are reported as revenue and net assets with donor restrictions. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Gifts of professional services are recorded at fair value at the date of donation.

Vet Assets

Vet assets without donor restrictions are those assets presently available for use by the Association at the discretion of the Board of Trustees. Board designated net assets are those net assets without donor restrictions that are set aside by the Board of Trustees for a specific purpose. Net assets with donor restrictions are those whose use by the Association has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose or have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Association in percetuity.

ncome Taxes

The Association is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and similar provisions of state income tax regulations.

New Accounting Pronouncements

FASB ASC 842, Leases

n February 2016, FASB issued Leases (ASU No. 2016-02), which is intended to improve financial eporting related to leasing transactions, and in July 2018, the FASB issued Leases. Targeted improvements to ASC 842 (ASU 2018-11), which provides relief of implementing certain components of the new lease guidance. The Association adopted ASC 842, effective January 1, 2022. The adoption of this standard did not have a significant impact on the financial statements.

FASB ASC 326. Current Expected Credit Losses ("CECL")

n June 2016, the FASB issued guidance (FASB ASC 326) which significantly changed how entities will measure credit losses for most financial assets and certain other instruments that aren't measured at 'air value through net income. The most significant change in this standard is a shift from the incurred oss model to the expected loss model. Under the standard, disclosures are required to provide users of the financial statements with useful information in analyzing an entity's exposure to credit risk and the measurement of credit losses. Financial assets held by the Association that are subject to the guidance in FASB ASC 326 were the loans receivable.

The Association adopted the standard effective January 1, 2023. The impact of the adoption was not considered material to the financial statements and primarily resulted in new/enhanced disclosures only.

Note 2. Loans Receivable

The Revolving Loan Fund provides permanent financing for mission churches. The churches enter into a note agreement with the Association, which contains a provision that the church will secure a commercial loan and repay the Revolving Loan Fund should the Association need the funds. Also, the cans contain a provision which allows for the interest rate on the loans to be adjusted during the annual review process by utilizing the current prime rate as a measurement mechanism. During the inancing period, the Revolving Loan Fund holds the title to the property as collateral for the loan until payments on the debt are complete. At the request of the church, the title will then be transferred to the church. As of December 31, 2023, the Revolving Loan Fund continues to hold the title to various properties. The Revolving Loan Fund provides financing, when necessary, for other phases of the Association's work.

The Association had no investments in impaired loans as determined by management at December 31, 2023 and 2022. Accruing loans 90 days past due as a percent of loans was 0.98 percent and 2.66 percent at December 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively.

Note 5. Notes Payable

Notes payable in the Revolving Loan Fund represent various loans from individuals, churches and associations. These loans are on a demand basis. The individual, church or association can, at any time, demand payment of these funds from the Association. At December 31, 2023, the notes consisted of 643 loans with an interest rates ranging from 2.5 to 5.0 percent with individual balances varying from \$1 to \$1.401,080. At December 31, 2022, the notes consisted of 585 loans with an interest rate of 2.0 percent with individual balances varying from \$1 to \$935,471. Interest expense totaled \$590,240 for the year ended December 31, 2023.

At December 31, 2023 and 2022, \$1,560,197 and \$1,142,089, respectively, represented related party payables. These related party payables consisted primarily of deposits from the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Missions Department

Note 6. Net Assets With Donor Restrictions

Net assets with donor restrictions totaling \$21,991 and \$14,148 as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively, are available for the purpose of future disaster relief situations.

Note 8. Fair Value

FASB ASC Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures ("ASC 820") establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets, for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described as follows:

- Level 1 Valuation is based upon quoted prices for identical instruments traded in active markets.
- Level 2 Valuation is based upon quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets or quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active.
- Level 3 Valuation is based on significant valuation assumptions that are not readily observable in the market.

The asset's fair value measurement level with the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The Association maintains a reserve to meet the daily operational and withdrawal requirements. These funds are maintained in interest-bearing accounts that are easily accessible. The Association utilizes unrestricted contributions and loan receivable proceeds to cover operating expenses.

Note 10. Concentration of Credit Risk and Market Risks

At December 31, 2023, the Association's cash deposit accounts were deposited in financial institutions and each was insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. However, approximately \$2,681,624 of the cash accounts exceeded the insurance limitation.

By-Laws Christian Publications Department

Article I — Name

This department shall be known as the Christian Publication's Department of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article II — Purpose

The purpose of this department shall be to:

Publish and distribute, as well as execute all secretarial and bookkeeping operations of the Mississippi Baptist Paper.

Article III — Location

This Department shall be located at such a place as deemed feasible by the manager and board of trustees upon the approval of the Association.

Article IV — Trustees

Section 1: The Election of Trustees:

The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect six trustees. These shall serve three year terms on a staggered basis with one-third of this number being elected each year in the annual session of the Association. Any vacancy on this board shall be filled at the next meeting of the Association after said vacancy has occurred.

Section 2: The Duties of the Trustees:

A. It shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees to seek out and recommend to the Association a Manager of Publications and/or an Editor of the Mississippi Baptist, as well as other employees as are necessary for the operation and maintenance of this Department.

B. This Board of Trustees shall give a detailed report of this Department at the Annual Session of the Association and reports of any other transactions that may transpire between annual meetings at the next meeting after such transactions shall have taken place.

Article V — Editor

Section 1: The Editor is to gather and edit information from every area of the state and from every department of the associated work.

Section 2: He must attend as many of the local associational committee meetings as possible, and all of the state associational meetings unless providentially hindered.

Section 3: He is to promote the financial growth of the paper by being available to visit the churches individually on behalf of the paper.

Section 4: He is to maintain an auditable set of books and financial records.

Section 5: He is to maintain an updated mailing list and to make periodic changes as needed to insure the best possible service to recipients of the paper.

Section 6: He is to keep churches informed monthly to their accounts status through monthly statements.

Section 7: He is responsible for information appearing in the Mississippi Baptist Paper and for the layout and proofing of such.

Section 8: He is to periodically meet with the Trustees of the Publications Department and to report to them and to the Association at its convening.

Editor's Final Report October 22, 2024 Annual Meeting at Campground Baptist Church Gulfport, Mississippi

Greetings to the messengers and churches of the BMA of Mississippi meeting in Annual Session October 22, 2024.

On March 27, 1978, at a Special Called Session of the BMA of Mississippi held at Creston Hills Baptist Church in Jackson, the messenger body approved the recommendation of Brother Don Brown by the trustees of the department.

That is the first line of the front-page article in the April 1, 1978, issue of your Mississippi Baptist.

I was saved October 13, 1974, while a member of Parkview Baptist Church, Gautier, Mississippi. Without sharing too many details, I credit the Lord leading me to my precious wife, Bonnie Diane Roberts, during our sophomore year in college, and turning our hearts toward each other, for my ultimate salvation. Even though I was a wayward church member and was baptized as a teenager, I was not a child of God. The Roberts family were faithful members of Liberty Baptist Church near Belzoni, Mississippi, and due to her upbringing, my wife always insisted on being faithful in church attendance. We were always in a BMA church - first in Greenville, Mississippi and later in Beaumont, Texas.

Moving back to Mississippi in 1973 we joined Parkview Church in Gautier and were blessed beyond measure by attending there. We found lifelong friends and the warmth of fellowshipping with God's people. It was not long before I realized my lost condition and the need for Christ.

I felt the Lord's call to ministry and answered that call on June 12, 1977. I told the Lord which church I wanted to pastor and begged Him to give it to me. In His wisdom and providence, He ignored my request! While I was desiring a ministry position, my pastor at the time saw that desire and he pointed me toward the opening of editor at the Mississippi Baptist Paper. He thought that would be a fit for me.

On New Year's Eve in 1977 my wife and I were attending a watchnight service at Shiloh Mission in Kosciusko, Mississippi. We both went to the alter and prayed that regardless of what God had for us that we would surrender to His will. It was after that service that I applied for this position and was elected just three months later.

The Association voted, we accepted, and the rest is history. Today I give my 47" report to this body. For the past 46 1/2 years this Association has provided support for my family and for this department. In the first 6 months as editor, we spent all the reserved funds that were available. We were broke! We appealed to the churches for support. You responded very well and have been responding well for all these years. There has never been a time that the Lord has not met the needs of this ministry. I take that as a blessing from Him and that our Lord supports the need to continuously communicate the needs

and blessings of the work of our great Association to our churches.

I ask your indulgence as I share a few thoughts. When I became your editor the state association held 3 meetings each year. My first state meeting as editor was two short months after my election in June 1978 at Broadmoor Church in Meridian. I had no idea what was expected or what to say. I was there, I reported, and I suppose it was acceptable. I was certainly nervous and was disappointed that none

of the current Publication Trustees were in attendance. That kind of affects one's confidence.

I have been blessed to attend each national meeting for the past 47 years, the first one in Albuquerque, New Mexico. For years attending the national meeting was like going on vacation. Don't misunderstand, there is always work involved. (Some of you think of it as a kind of vacation too - even if you don't say it out loud.)

I think I have missed one mid-year meeting during my tenure and that was due to a very bad case of the flu. In the 46 1/2 years as your editor, I have missed publishing one issue. In 1984, Dr. Gerald Kellar and I sponsored a trip to Israel.

We had a wonderful time spending 10 days in Jordan, Israel, and Egypt. We flew back home from Amsterdam to Atlanta and were really pumped about all we had experienced and seen. We could not wait to get home. After leaving the Atlanta airport headed back to Laurel, it took us about 30 minutes to realize that we all were experiencing a super case of jetlag. We stopped and got rooms so we could get much needed rest and traveled safely home the next day. This was a day or two into the month of June and the June 1st issue was due. It was not to be. I explained the circumstances in the June 15 issue, and I assume all was well. I have been blessed to travel to mission fields and if you have ever traveled overseas, you most likely also know about jetlag.

As with any ministry or job, there is always what I call a 'learning curve'. I look back on issues of the paper that I did early in this ministry, and I can see my own learning curve. The people of our churches were patient with me and that is appreciated. Just as a pastor comes to a new ministry field, the members of his church would do well to be patient with him. Remember that he is not the former pastor and should not be expected to do all things as those who came before him.

I share these thoughts with you to emphasize that if you approve the recommendation of the Publications Trustees, there needs to be understanding and a time to be patient. There are certain things that will and must remain constant, but your editor will have editorial control and use editorial discretion. He is the editor. He will not be allowed to do some things and using good judgment, he will look over this ministry as a pastor does over his own flock. I have shared with the nominee that each church has its own personality and as such should be respected and dealt with individually. I have tried to do that during my time as editor.

The Mississippi Baptist Paper is the result of a newsletter started by the Children's Home ministry over 78 years ago. The paper was offered to the association to serve as our state paper and the association accepted this ministry.

Each previous editor served on a part-time basis. The goal of having a full-time editor was achieved with my election. A previous editor told me that he was hoping to expand to a weekly publication. I shared the economic side with him and told him that the funds were just not available to make that a

reality. I was allowed to move to Laurel in 1980 and join the staff of Southeastern College. I was still the full-time editor and a part-timer at the college. My wife also began working at the college in the Fall of 1980 and retired after 32 years in December 2012.

A couple of years ago we made the change to a monthly publication. This was the result of more than one thing. Our subscription list is smaller than was sufficient to maintain 2 issues per month. Fewer subscribers meant less income. The cost of printing and postage has seen several increases in recent years and with our subscription base declining, which lowers our income, the move was one of necessity. Church attendance is seemingly less than it was many years ago. Mailings lists

were reduced. Churches have left our work. I pray that this trend will stop and we can grow, reach more people, and magnify the work of the Lord.

I do not brag with these next few words but only to share some personal thoughts. Frank Sinatra sang a song with these lines,

"I've been a puppet, a pauper, a pirate, a poet, a pawn and a king,
I've been up and down and over and out and I know one thing
Each time I find myself Flat on my face
I pick myself up and get Back in the race"
Well,

I've been an editor, a coach, a recruiter, an interim pastor, and a pastor.

I may have been up some and down some and I know one thing
I'm a husband, a father, a grandfather, and a Great-grandfather

(three times over)

I've been blessed and blessed and blessed and blessed And by the way,

I'm getting older and have been a senior citizen for quite some time

And now get to spend some time working with and

ministering to our Senior Saints.

Life has been good!

The name of Frank Sinatra's song is "That's Life". I'll just name my song, "That's a life blessed by God".

I can honestly say that I have been blessed to be your editor. I have made friendships with many whom I would otherwise never have known. I have experienced spiritual blessings that I believe would not have been available elsewhere. God is good and He has been good to Donnie Brown.

The committee also approved transferring the post office account from Laurel to Wiggins.


A motion and second were made to adopt Bro. Don Brown's final report and transfer of banking and financial equipment to Bro. Scott Kirkland and was approved.

By-laws of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc.

Article I — Name, Domicile, Fiscal Year and Powers

- 1. The name of the Corporation shall be "The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc." Its domicile and principal place of business shall be at 4226 Highway15 North, Laurel, Jones County, Mississippi. Its corporate seal shall bear the title, "The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc., Laurel, Mississippi," or such condensation thereof as the Trustees may approve. Its fiscal year shall be from August 1st until July 31st.
- 2. The Corporation shall have power to have and use a corporate seal; to sue and be sued in its corporate name; to take, receive, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, own, hold, conserve, protect, exchange or otherwise deal in and with real or personal property or any interest therein wherever situated and to sell, convey, transfer and otherwise dispose of all or any part of its property and assets and to invest and re-invest the proceeds; to purchase, subscribe for or otherwise acquire, own, hold, vote, use, employ, sell or otherwise dispose of shares or other interests in obligations of other domestic or foreign corporations, or direct or indirect obligations of the United States or of any other government, State, territory, governmental district or municipality, or any other instrumentality thereof, but not in violation of any law; to make contracts, conduct affairs, carry on its operations and exercise its powers in any state, territory, district or possession of the United States or in any foreign country; to elect, appoint or employ officers, agents, and employees, and to define their duties and fix the compensation of any employee; to make and alter bylaws not inconsistent with its Articles of Incorporation or with the laws of the State for the administration and regulation of its affairs; and to have and exercise all powers necessary, convenient or incidental to any and all of the purposes for which it is organized.

Article II — Purposes

- 1. The general purpose of the Corporation shall be to establish, maintain and enlarge a Foundation:
- (a) To solicit, acquire, and accept gifts, bequests and devises of money, stocks, bonds, real property, and personal property of every nature and kind, and to use those properties exclusively for the official departments, commissions, entities or projects under the direction of, authority of, and sponsored by the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and the promotion of the Christian faith generally, and to serve as a means whereby donors may make gifts for such purposes; but the Corporation shall not use its funds, assets or properties for the purposes of carrying on propaganda or attempting to influence legislation in violation of Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or for any other purpose prohibited by said section to corporations which are thereby exempt from taxation; the Corporation shall not have the power to, and shall not, carry on political propaganda, or otherwise attempt to influence legislation or to participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or against any candidate for public office; and shall never grant or donate any of its money, assets or property by gift, donation or otherwise to any organization, firm or corporation other than those listed, mentioned and contemplated in Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or any other law of similar import enacted in the exercise of its taxing authority by the Congress of the United

States. The Corporation shall from time to time invest, handle, manage, exchange, reinvest and generally control its funds, assets and property so as to obtain for the Corporation the most advantageous yield of income therefrom, consistent with the safety of investment;

- (b) To receive, maintain, and accept as assets of the Corporation any property, whether real, personal, or mixed, by way of gift, bequest, devise, or purchase from any person, firm, trust or corporation, to be held, administered, and disposed of exclusively for charitable, religious, education, and scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, and in accordance with and pursuant to the provision of these Articles of Incorporation; but no gift, bequest, devise, or purchase of any such property shall be received or made and accepted if it is conditioned or limited in such manner as shall require the disposition of income or principal to any organization other than a "charitable organization" or for any other purposes other than "charitable purposes" which would jeopardize the status of the Corporation as an entity exempt from Federal Income Tax pursuant to the relevant provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended;
- (c) To exclusively promote and carry on any other religious, charitable, or educational purposes and activities for which corporations may be organized and operated under the relevant provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, and under the Mississippi Nonprofit Corporation Act, Section 79-11-101 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended;
- (d) No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, directors, officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensations for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in these Articles of Incorporation. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislations, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office;
- (e) Anything contained in these Articles of Incorporation to the contrary notwith-standing, the Corporation shall not carry on or otherwise engage in any activities not permitted to be carried on or engaged in by (i) a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or any corresponding section of any further tax code; (ii) a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or any corresponding section of any future tax code; or (iii) a corporation organized and existing under the Mississippi Nonprofit Corporation Act; and
- (f) In the event of the dissolution and liquidation of this Corporation, to the extent allowed or permitted under applicable laws, the property and assets of the Corporation shall be, as determined by the Trustees, distributed to or sold and the proceeds of such sales distributed to (i) Southeastern Baptist College Foundation, Inc., a Mississippi Nonprofit Corporation and a corporation exempt from taxation under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or (ii) any other organization(s) organized and operating for the same purposes for which the Corporation is organized and operating or any organization(s), foundation(s), fund(s), or corporation(s) organized and operating exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, or educational, or other purposes permitted by Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, all of which such organizations, foundations, funds, or corporations shall be exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended. In the event that any assets are not disposed of in accor-

dance with the provisions of these Articles of Incorporation or that the Corporation shall fail to act within a reasonable time in the manner provided in these Articles of Incorporation, the Chancery Court of Jones County, Mississippi, shall, upon application of one or more persons having a real interest in the Corporation or its assets, make such distribution(s) as provided in these Articles of Incorporation.

Article III — Members

- 1. All member churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi are members of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc.
- 2. A regular annual meeting of the members of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. shall be held at the same time and place as the regular annual business meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi in each calendar year. Notice of such meeting shall be given by announcement or publication at the same time and in like manner as notice is given for the annual meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- 3. Special meetings may be called in the same manner as special meetings of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi. Notice shall be given by announcement or publication in the same manner as notice is given for special meetings of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and such notice shall state the purposes of the special meeting.
- 4. Each Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. member attending shall be entitled to three (3) votes. Ten percent (10%) of the members shall constitute a quorum. If a quorum be not present, the President may recess the meeting from time to time until a quorum shall attend.

Article IV — Officers

- 1. "There shall be eight (8) Trustees of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, Inc., who shall have the general charge and management of the Foundation."
- 2. The eight (8) Trustees shall be five (5) Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Departments of Work Directors listed herein and the three (3) Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Commission Directors listed herein:
 - A. Department of Work Directors:
 - (1) State Missions;
 - (2) Southeastern Baptist College;
 - (3) Mississippi Baptist Children's Home;
 - (4) Christian Publications; and
 - (5) Youth Department.
 - B. Commission Directors:
 - (1) Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives; and
 - (2) Christian Action Commission.
 - (3) Mississippi Baptist Commission on Senior Adult Ministry.

The terms of the Trustees herein designated shall commence and end with their respective tenures. If any Trustee shall die, retire, resign or become unable to serve actively for whatever reason, the successor to said Trustee shall be the person who subsequently fills the above referenced vacant Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Department of Work Director or Commission Director, as the case may be.

"In the event that one individual should be the Director of more than one of the eight (8) Departments or Commissions, the Director will choose which of the Departments or Commissions for which he/she will serve as a Trustee for the Foun-

dation. For the other Departments or Commissions for which he/she serves as Director, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of said Departments or Commission will serve as a Trustee of the Foundation."

- 3. Each Trustee shall have one (1) vote.
- 4. The Trustees shall elect from their number each year at their annual meeting a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and Assistant Secretary-Treasurer. The President shall preside at all meetings of the members and of the Trustees and shall have such duties and powers as usually appertain to the office of President, including the countersignature of checks. The Vice-President shall perform all duties of the President in his absence or disability. The Secretary-Treasurer or Assistant Secretary-Treasurer shall be custodian of the corporate seal; shall record the minutes of all meetings of the members and of the Trustees; shall be responsible for the safekeeping of all The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. funds; shall sign all checks; acknowledge the receipt of all gifts; deposit all funds; keep the books and records; and otherwise perform all duties which appertain to the office of Secretary-Treasurer. For the faithful performance of his duties, the Secretary-Treasurer or Assistant Secretary-Treasurer shall be required to give a fidelity bond with a registered surety company in such amount as may be required from time to time by the Trustees.

Article V — Duties And Powers Of Trustees

- 1. The Trustees shall meet from time to time upon call of the President, or of any three (3) Trustees, but at least twice each year. Such meetings may be held at any convenient time and place which the President, or a majority of the Trustees may fix. At each meeting the Secretary-Treasurer or Assistant Secretary-Treasurer shall give a fully detailed report of the current financial condition of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. and shall, upon the request of any Trustee, exhibit the originals of all papers, bank accounts, records, and securities of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. It shall be the duty of each Trustee individually to satisfy himself that the financial affairs of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. are being properly conducted in an efficient manner, but a Trustee shall not be individually liable for an error of judgment or for any action or non-action motivated by good faith.
- 2. The Trustees shall keep the principal, if any, of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. funds prudently invested in time deposits, bonds of the United States or its agencies, other high-grade bonds, or investment grade common or preferred stocks of high quality, for the purposes of obtaining the highest yield consistent with safety and preserving and enhancing the value of the principal. Where feasible, time deposits shall be in institutions whose deposits are guaranteed by an instrumentality of the United States Government. Funds may be pooled.
- 3. The Trustees shall, upon receiving any gift or bequest, make a permanent record of any specific designation of the use of the property or principal or income therefrom which may be made by the donor, and it shall be the duty of the Trustees to see that any property or principal or income which has been designated for a specific purpose shall be used for such purpose or institution. The Trustees shall have the right, however to decline to accept any gift or bequest when, in the judgment of four (4) of them, its acceptance would not be to the best interest of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. A donor may change the designation of the purpose for which his gift shall be used, provided such change shall not impair an outstanding commitment of The Baptist Missionary Association

of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. Where gifts or bequests are made without specific designations of what the property or principal or income therefrom shall be used for, the Trustees shall use such property or principal or income by dividing same equally among the Departments and Commissions represented by the Trustees.

- 4. At any meeting of the Trustees, four (4) shall constitute a quorum. At least four (4) Trustees must concur in any decision or action.
- 5. The Trustees may within their discretion engage the services of an independent auditor or accountant to audit the books and records of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. annually, or oftener if they deem it necessary. The Trustees shall receive no compensation for their services as Trustees, nor shall any Trustee derive any pecuniary benefit from his office, directly or indirectly. A Trustee may, however, be reimbursed for any out-of-pocket expenditure which he may necessarily make on behalf of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc.
- 6. The Trustees shall submit a detailed report of the financial condition and operation of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. to the members at each annual meeting, and at any other times when the members request such report. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to keep the members fully informed of all financial transactions of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. except that the Trustees shall not violate any confidence of any donor or beneficiary.
- 7. The Trustees shall pay normal operating expenses of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. They may use the office, clerical and accounting facilities of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi to such extent as may not impose a burden upon the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and for the use of such facilities no fees or compensation shall be paid.
- 8. In the event that any purpose or institution for which a contribution to The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. has been made should fail, or cease to exist, the Trustees shall be authorized to apply the doctrine of cy pres within their sole discretion.

Article VI — Investment Committee

The Trustees may elect an Investment Committee consisting of three (3) Trustees serving terms coinciding with their terms as Trustees.

Article VII — Bank Account Signatures

Two (2) Trustees' signatures shall be required on all bank accounts, checks, etc. of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc.

Article VIII — Operating Expenses

The operating expenses of The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi Foundation, Inc. shall be paid in equal portions by each Department of Work and each Commission represented by a Trustee.

Article IX — Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution and liquidation of this Corporation, to the extent allowed or permitted under applicable laws, the property and assets of the Corporation shall be, as determined by the Board of Directors, distributed to or sold and the proceeds of such sales distributed to (i) Southeastern Baptist College Foundation, Inc., a Mississippi Nonprofit Corporation and a corporation exempt from taxation under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or (ii) any

other organization(s) organized and operating for the same purposes for which the Corporation is organized and operating or any organization(s), foundation(s), fund(s), or corporation(s) organized and operating exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, or educational, or other purposes permitted by Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, all of which such organizations, foundations, funds, or corporations shall be exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended. In the event that any assets are not disposed of in accordance with the provisions of these Articles of Incorporation or that the Corporation shall fail to act within a reasonable time in the manner provided in these Articles of Incorporation, the Chancery Court of Jones County, Mississippi, shall, upon application of one or more persons having a real interest in the Corporation or its assets, make such distribution(s) as provided in the Articles of Incorporation.

Article X — Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the members of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi by a majority vote of those in attendance.

Audit Note

The trustees of the BMA of Mississippi Foundation have not called for an audit due to the lack of activity. An audit is not necessary by statute and will be called for at a future time when it is deemed necessary.

By-Laws

Mississippi Baptist Commission On Senior Adults

Article I — Name

This organization shall be known as the Mississippi Baptist Commission on Senior Adults.

Article II — Purpose

The purpose of this Commission shall be to:

- 1. To encourage all BMA Churches to organize and maintain an active Senior Adult Ministry and work.
- 2. Assist the churches of the BMA of Mississippi, when possible, to organize a Senior Adult Ministry in their church.
- 3. Provide the churches, when possible, material that will assist Senior Adult groups.
- 4. Encourage church Senior Adult groups to reach out to all Senior Adults in their community.
- 5. Encourage all Senior Adults to remain active in all areas of their church ministries as much so as possible.
 - A. Senior Adults make themselves available for service when called upon.
- 6. Encourage pastors and churches to take advantage of the wealth of knowledge, experience, wisdom, and financial strength in many Senior Adults, and to use these Seniors when possible.

Article III — Personnel and Duties

Section 1: Personnel

The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a committee of six. These shall serve three year terms on a staggered basis with one third of this number being elected each year in the annual session of the Association. Any vacancy on this committee shall be filled the next meeting of the Association after said vacancy occurred.

Section 2: Duties

The duties of this committee shall be:

- a. Seek out and recommend a director to the Association.
- b. Assist the director in planning and promoting the work and activities of the Commission.

Article IV — Director

Section 1: Personnel

The Baptist Missionary Association shall elect a director of the Mississippi Baptist Commission on Senior Adults.

Section 2: Duties

The director's responsibilities shall include:

- a. Chair all meetings of the commission.
- b. Make recommendations to the commission and to the association for implementing the work of the commission.
- c. Promote the support of the commission among the churches of the association.
 - d. Give a report at the annual and mid-year sessions of the association.
- e. Assist pastors, Senior Adult leaders, and churches in their work with Senior Adults when help is requested.

Commission on Senior Adults 2024 Annual Report Don Brown, Director

In our report last year we noted that the fastest growing group in our nation today is Senior Adults. The U.S. population age 65 and over grew nearly five times faster than the total population over the 100 years from 1920 to 2020. One in six in the United States is over the age of 65 and that percentage is growing. I think we can validate that in our churches by just looking at those in attendance on any given Lord's Day. As our population ages our responsibility to look after their needs becomes more critical. The financial cost of getting older is evident if you are 65 or older.

The aging process presents folks with more physical and financial concerns. One thing that helps us deal with these issues is our spiritual condition. Those who are saved and serve have a different outlook on this phase of life than those who are lost. I think the Lord wants us to age gracefully...we certainly cannot stop the process, but we can help to manage the process. The Senior Adult Theme for 2025 is "Our Personal Legacy". Pray for us as we work out this process and commit ourselves to a legacy that honors our Savior and is a blessing and inspiration to those who follow.

Our 2024 meetings were well attended. In 2022 we added a feature to our meetings and began adopting special projects and taking a special support offering. This has helped us work toward our Theme for the past three years of 'Prime Timers With A Purpose'. In 2024 our senior adults gave offerings totaling \$4,014.35. These monies were divided between a mission project in Chile to help a church build their own worship facility and to LifeWord to help with a expense for a studio in Lebanon. Our folks care about the Lord's work and were excited to support these two ministries. This will be a continuing feature of future conferences.

In Billy Graham's book "Nearing Home" he states the following, "For those who are retired and still in good health, there are many opportunities for service. We should always be expecting the Lord to reveal His plans for us. Just because we are retired does not mean our work is done. Retirement provides us the opportunity to spend more time doing God's work, serving others in the name of the Lord." That quote reveals the sentiments of this director and the purpose of this commission. May God lead us and grant us opportunities for serving Him.

Final plans have been made for our two conferences in March and May 2025. Our North Conference will again be hosted by Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church in Fulton and Pastor Tim Holsonback. We will meet on Tuesday May 13, 2025. They have great facilities and good folks who jump in to help. The men of the church will once again cook our noon meal of catfish and chicken with all the trimmings.

The South Conference will be hosted by Big Creek Baptist Church, the WMA of Big Creek Church, and pastor Adam Sloan. Big Creek has hosted this meeting for a number of years, and they always do a great job. Macks Catfish will once again be serving our noon meal.

We will do something a little different for both conferences. Our music guests will be the *Harper Collective*. They were previously known as the *Harper Family*, but there have been changes. The kids grew up, got married, and have families of their own. Some of the new family members now are part of their music ministry and thus the new name. The Harpers will be at both of our meetings and will handle all our music for the day. We look forward to having them back with us.

Our senior adult church members have historically been a rock of stability in our churches. They have been faithful to the Lord's work, and we strive to give them these two events as a ministry of thanks, fellowship, worship, and encouragement. I urge each church to pay the fee for your senior adults to attend. This would be a wonderful way to show your appreciation to them for their faithfulness. It is also a great way to reach out to the unchurched or inactive seniors in your membership.

Support

We are keeping our conference fee at \$20.00. This covers the meal and a small part of our overall cost of operation. Currently we have 4 local associations and 29 churches that supported this ministry this past fiscal year. We deeply appreciate their support and earnestly ask each of our churches to join this ministry by including your Senior Adult Commission in your regular monthly budget. The Commission needs your support, and we are asking each church to consider giving at least a \$25.00 per month offering. I believe most of our churches could do this and we ask for your help. Local associations could also add us to their monthly support budgets.

We held our first Special Emphasis Drive this past June and appreciate all who gave. We encourage all our churches to respond to this appeal this coming June.

Each conference costs much more than the fees our seniors pay. We try to provide quality conferences with features that encourage and bless those attending. The cost for everything has risen and this is true for our activities as well. Your help and support are essential to this ministry.

Trustees

The trustees of your Senior Adult Commission are faithful and intimately involved in this work. They have a heart for the work of this Commission. We appreciate their support and leadership. They are a blessing, and we thank them for their service.

Pray for this work, pray for and support the senior adults in your church, and support your PrimeTimers who have a purpose and a passion for our Lord's work.

I am blessed to be the director of the Commission on Senior Adults. I count it as a privilege to serve and look forward to blessing our senior adults through this ministry.

Final Thoughts

The Psalmist wrote the following in Psalm 71 - O God, thou hast taught me from my youth: and hitherto have I declared thy wondrous works. 18 Now also when I am old and grayheaded, O God, forsake me not; until I have shewed thy strength unto this generation, and thy power to every one that is to come. (vss) 17-18

Our seniors are an example to the younger generations.... let us now serve them for their faithful service to us and leave a Legacy pleasing to our Lord.

Moral Action of Mississippi of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi

Article I — Name

Section 1: This department shall be known as the Moral Action of Mississippi of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article II — Purpose

Section 1: The purpose of this commission is to present Christ as Savior to all with whom it may come into contact.

Section 2: To be responsible for leading our churches in the promotion of biblical morality in all areas of our society and in fighting the evils of our time, such as: alcohol, pornography, sodomy, gambling, child abuse, abortion, and all kindred evils that endanger the human race, the church, and the family.

Section 3: To be responsible for writing or securing printed materials that show the biblical position of our people on all the things mentioned in Article II, Section 2.

Section 4: To be responsible for an organized effort among our people to present our views on all that is found in Article II, Section 2.

Section 5: To be responsible for and available to lead in study courses, clinics, and conferences for the purposes of better informing our people of the evils that confront us and how we should deal with them biblically.

Article III — Trustees

Section 1: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect nine trustees to serve three-year terms on a staggered basis with three being elected each year; five of these shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2: The trustees will be nominated by the nominating committee of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 3: The trustees shall elect annually from their number a chairman, assistant chairman, secretary, and assistant secretary.

Section 4: Duties of Trustees-

- 1. To act in council with the director of this commission on all matters that concern the Moral Action of Mississippi.
 - 2. To be a representative of this commission in their area of the state.
- 3. To be available to join the director and others in lobbying the legislative bodies of our state and nation to make known our stand as stated in Article II, section 2.
- 4. To carry out the wishes of our churches in all matters concerning this commission.
- 5. To bring before the Association recommendations they feel are in the best interests of this commission and our people.
- 6. To present a nominee to the association to serve as director of this commission.

Article IV — Director

Section 1: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a director of the Moral Action of Mississippi of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 2: Duties of Director -

- 1. Shall serve as director of the Moral Action of Mississippi.
- 2. The director shall make recommendations to the trustees of the association in implementing the work of this commission.
- 3. The director shall serve as the treasurer of this commission and shall receive and disburse all funds as directed.
- 4. The director is authorized to promote the work of this commission among the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- 5. The director shall give a full report in annual session of the association and shall present a proposed plan of work and proposed budget for the ensuing year.
- 6. The director shall receive such compensation as may be designated by the association.

By-Laws Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives

Article I — Name

This organization shall be known as the Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives

Article II — Purpose

The purpose of this commission shall be to:

- 1. Gather and preserve information from the churches, pastors, missionaries, and various departments of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
 - 2. Publish information when necessary.
- 3. Correspond and cooperate with other archival libraries for exchange information.
 - 4. Collect and disburse funds received and give regular reports to the association.

Article III — Staff

Section 1: Trustees

- (a) The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect six trustees to serve three-year terms on a staggered basis. Two shall be elected each year; four of these shall constitute a quorum.
- (b) The trustees will be nominated by the nominating committee of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
- (c) The trustees shall elect annually from their number a chairman, assistant chairman, secretary, and assistant secretary.
 - (d) Duties of Trustees:
 - 1. To act as a council to the director of this commission.
- $\,$ 2. To carry out the wishes of our churches in all matters concerning this commission.
 - 3. To approve an annual budget.
 - 4. Promote the commission.
 - 5. Assist and encourage the gathering of material for the commission.
- 6. To present a nominee to the association to serve as director of this commission.

Section 2: Director

- (a) Personnel: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a director of the Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives.
 - (b) Duties: The director's responsibility is to:
 - 1. Chair all meetings of the commission.
- 2. Make recommendations to the commission and the association for implementing the work of the commission.
 - 3. Gather historical materials to be placed in the collection.
- 4. Promote the support of the commission among the churches of the association.
 - 5. Give a report at the annual and midyear sessions of the association.

Section 3: Librarian And Designated Personnel

(a) Personnel: The librarian of Southeastern Baptist College shall serve as the

custodian of the commission's holdings.

- (b) Duties: The librarian or designated person's responsibility is to:
 - 1. Catalog and file all holdings of the commission.
- 2. Serve as the treasurer of the commission and to receive and disburse funds as directed by a majority vote of the commission and/or association.
- 3. Supply a financial report to the director to be given at the annual session of the association.

Section 4: Historian

- (a) Personnel: The director of the commission shall appoint a historian.
- (b) Duties: The historian's responsibility is to:
 - 1. Assist the director in gathering historical materials.
- 2. Prepare a summary of the history of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi and update it annually.
 - 3. Assist the librarian in the maintenance of the collection.
 - 4. Formulate policies pertaining to the collection holdings.

(The following is not part of the Constitution of the History and Archives, but is included as general information.)

Policy Statement

The Mississippi Baptist Commission on History and Archives was created for the express purpose of gathering information from the churches, pastors, missionaries, and various departments of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

The following guidelines deal with the types of materials and number of copies to be placed in the Archives Room at the A.R. Reddin Memorial Library at Southeastern Baptist College, Laurel, Mississippi. They will also indicate the method of use, availability, and disposal of these materials.

Types Of Materials

Minutes — 1. State, Local, and National BMA Associations (No more than two copies of the minutes will be kept.) 2. Other State and Local BMA Associations (These will not be sought after, but if they are sent, one copy will be kept.) 3. Church Minutes (One copy of individual church minutes if a church desires to store them in the archives room.) 4. Other BMA Organizations (One copy of the minutes of any BMA organization, such as WMA, Brotherhood, A.B.S., Ministerial Alliance, etc.)

Books — 1. Books concerning History of Christianity (one copy) 2. Books concerning noteworthy Christians, Martyrs, and/or Baptists (one copy) 3. Books concerning Baptist Church History (one copy) 4. Books by Individuals - Books written by any member of a BMA church that pertains to Christianity, church history, and/or Baptist heritage. (one copy)

Periodicals, Newspapers — 1. The Mississippi Baptist and other Mississippi State Papers (no more than two copies) 2. BMAM Church Papers, Newsletters, Bulletins (no more than two copies) 3. BMA Papers of other States (These will not be sought after, but if they are sent, one copy will be kept.)

Other Publications — 1. Any manuscript, pamphlet, tract, leaflet, etc., by a member of a BMA church or anything concerning BMA work (one copy) 2. Records of and materials concerning any department of state, local, and national BMA work

Use And Availability — 1. The archival materials are available to the students of Southeastern Baptist College, to ministers and laymen of BMA churches, or to any interested individual. 2. These materials are not to be taken from the Archives Room. (They may be removed only by a member of the Commission on History and Archives and must be returned promptly.) 3. Copies may be made for individuals of any item, with the exception of materials too fragile to be handled. Church minutes may be copied only with written consent of the church whose minutes are involved.

Disposal Of Materials — 1. Extra materials may be placed in the A.R. Reddin Memorial Library for free access to patrons of the library. 2. Extras may be offered to other BMA college and seminary libraries. 3. Extras may be offered to the members of BMA churches through the medium of the state paper or by displaying in the library during the annual meeting of the BMAM. 4. Remaining materials shall be thrown out. Only in the case of bound books will any of these materials be sold. If sold, the proceeds will go to the general fund of the Commission on History and Archives.

Mississippi Baptist Children's Home By-Laws

Article I — Name And Location

Section 1: This institution shall be known as the Mississippi Baptist Children's Home.

Section 2: The Mississippi Baptist Children's Home is located near Highway 15, North of Laurel, in Jones County, Mississippi.

Article II — Purpose

Section 1: The purpose of this institution shall be wholly benevolent, and that benevolence shall be extended to the care of children in need. The care of such children shall include food, clothing, shelter, education, religious training, and such other industrial training as may be provided to better prepare the children to take care of themselves after they leave the Home.

Article III — Ownership

Section 1: The Mississippi Baptist Children's Home shall be owned, controlled and maintained by the churches composing the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 2: Necessary bank accounts shall be maintained for the Home by the Director.

Article IV — Trustees

Section 1: The officers of this institution shall be a Board of Trustees consisting of fifteen (15) members.

Section 2: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi will elect nine (9) of the trustees. These trustees will serve three year terms with three (3) being elected each year.

Section 3: The Baptist Missionary Association of Alabama and the Baptist Missionary Association of Louisiana will each elect two (2) trustees representing the northern and southern portions of each state.

Section 4: The Mt. Pisgah Missionary Baptist Association will elect two (2) trustees.

Section 5: Eight (8) trustees shall constitute a quorum, five (5) of which must be from churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article V — Duties Of Trustees

Section 1: They shall have full and complete control of this institution between the sessions of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Section 2: In the event of a vacancy in the office of Director, they shall present a nomination to the Association.

Section 3: They shall, in consultation with the Director, hire such employees that are necessary for the operation and maintenance of the Home, and to determine the salary, duties, and obligations of said employees.

Section 4: They may demand the resignation of the Director and any other employee for unfaithfulness or incompetency.

Section 5: They shall be authorized to hold title to all properties of the Mississippi Baptist Children's Home. They may buy and sell land and make permanent improvements when the financial condition makes it wise to do so.

Section 6: They shall give reports at each regular session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi, giving all information that may be of interest to the churches, excluding confidential matters.

Section 7: They shall approve admission of children into the Home and the release of children from the Home.

Article VI — Reception Of Children

Section 1: The general qualifications of the admission of children to our Children's Home shall be left to the discretion of the Director and Trustees.

Section 2: All applications for the admission of children into the Home shall be made in writing, and shall contain such information as may be required by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3: The Trustees or Director shall investigate and approve all applications for the admission of children into the Home and three (3) Trustees shall serve as subcommittee for the emergency cases in the absence of the Director.

Section 4: All children admitted into the Home shall be legally assigned to the Home, Director, or Staff and if there is no one connected with the child or children who are competent to sign legal assignment papers, the Judge of the proper court will be asked to assume custody of such children and legally commit them to the Home.

Article VII — Finances

Section 1: All funds for the maintenance and improvements of the Home shall be raised by:

- (a) Voluntary contributions, gifts, and bequests;
- (b) Interest on invested funds;
- (c) Income from the farm:
- (d) Such profits as may accrue to the Home from any and all industries which may be established;
- (e) Such other sources of revenue as may be found to add to the income of the Home for any and all purposes.

Section 2: All money, groceries, dry goods, livestock, implements, and other gifts, donations, and bequests shall be received by the Director and applied according to Article III, Section 2 hereof. No funds shall be raised by individual begging by the children in the Home. All donors are encouraged to assist the Home financially in the care and support of the children. All donors are urged to make donations to the Home rather than to the children.

Article VIII — Release Of Children

Section 1: Children will be released from the Home by the Trustees or Director as soon as they are prepared to take care of themselves; or they are adopted into good homes; or some responsible person assumes their care.

Section 2: Any child guilty of conduct which cannot be corrected or amended and is demoralizing to other children of the Home may be expelled by the Trustees or Director, but only after a careful investigation, a full record of which shall be kept.

Article IX — General Provisions

Section 1: Separation of boys and girls. The boys and girls shall be kept separate in the Home, except during activities relating to social, educational, and religious lives, and those activities shall be properly supervised by the House Parents.

Section 2: Amusements for the children shall be of an elevating character. No questionable games shall be played in the buildings or on the campus.

Section 3: No Director or House Parent shall be employed in the Home who is not a Christian and a BMA Baptist, or refuses to attend the home church of the Mississippi Baptist Children's Home.

Section 4: All employees working for the Home will be Christians.

Section 5: The dress code applies as found in other writings.

Section 6: All discipline shall be administered by the guidelines set forth by the Home discipline policy and also in accordance with the Department of Human Services guidelines.

Article X — Director

Section 1: The Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi shall elect a Director for the Children's Home.

Section 2: Duties:

- a. He shall supervise the duties of all staff members in accordance with job descriptions written by the Director and Trustees and such descriptions shall be on file at the business office.
- b. He will promote the work of the Children's Home among the churches of the various associations in the states of Mississippi, Alabama, and Louisiana and among the churches of the Mt. Pisgah Association and where opportunities are afforded.
 - c. He shall receive and dispense all funds.
- d. He will be responsible for receiving, releasing, and keeping permanent records of the children as stated in the by-laws.
- e. He shall be responsible for the handling of court cases and all legal matters.
 - f. He shall be responsible for all children at all times.
- g. He shall give a report at each regular session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.
 - h. He shall work with the trustees in carrying out the will of the churches.

Article XI — Statement Of Policy Of The Board Of Trustees

When it is fully proven that any worker at our Home has used gossip, backbiting, tattling, insinuations, or other means, causing disturbance in the Home, they may be dismissed immediately and their pay terminated by the Director. Any valid complaint will be heard by the Director, after which it may be brought to the Board of Trustees.

Children's Home Director's Report October 22, 2024

There is a question that I don't think anyone likes, "Do you want the good news or the bad news?" It's one of those scenarios that is often a lose, lose. If there is good news that has to be paired with bad, then there is a real issue that shouldn't be ignored. Such is life.

We have had a good year serving children and families. We served 4 new children this year alone, for multiple months each. We served through a multitude of situations as well. We help children with learning hurdles, emotional struggles, language barriers, and past trauma. Serving each these various situations is never easy; you never feel like you have a good handle on it. Most of the time you just feel like you are along for the ride. We have also been given the opportunity to

counsel parents in their difficult situations. We are thankful for all these opportunities to minister the love of Christ in these situations.

The not so good news: We have had a couple of serious behavioral issues this year. While kids and poor behavior decisions are nothing new under the sun, they can be more taxing during busy times of activities that put a strain on everyone in the house. On a completely separate issue we have experienced a great loss. At the beginning of September one of our young men was returned to an extended family member. We have loved and cared for this young man from age 8-12. Going through this right before all our end of the year reports and work has made for a difficult time for grief. I'm not yet ready to put into words all the feelings we are still going through.

The better news: As believers we always have good news that outweighs the bad news. The Lord brought to remembrance a familiar story from His word. In Exodus 17 we see Israel's first battle after crossing the Red Sea. Moses tells Joshua to go to battle with Amalek while Moses, Aaron, Hur go up to the top of a Hill. Exodus 17:10-12, "So Joshua did as Moses had said to him, and fought with Amalek: and Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. And it came to pass, when Moses held up his hand, that Israel prevailed: and when he let down his hand, Amalek prevailed. But Moses' hands were heavy; and they took a stone, and put it under him, and he sat thereon; and Aaron and Hur stayed up his hands, the one on the one side, and the other on the other side; and his hands were steady until the going down of the sun." Ministry is hard and it is tiring. We hurt often in this ministry, but we are not alone. We have the Lord. We have his people with us. We can see other believers fighting the good fight. We can pray and serve where the Lord has placed us. We can praise Him for sending His people to prop us up in our weariness. As we continue to serve, pray for workers to join us in serving children and families.

Brotherhood Constitution Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi

Article I — Name

The name of this organization shall be the Brotherhood of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article II — Purpose

The purpose of this organization is:

- 1. To promote and sponsor the Galilean program.
- 2. The promotion of the cooperation endeavors of Missionary Baptist.
- 3. The promotion of fellowship among Missionary Baptist men.
- 4. To assist in the establishment of local Brotherhoods in churches which have no Brotherhood.

duly elected messengers from the Brotherhood of the local churches cooperating with the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi. The messengers shall be members of the churches which they represent. The churches are urged to elect laymen as messengers

Article VI — Amendments

This Constitution and By-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a twothirds vote.

Constitution of the State Galileans Article I

The name of this organization shall be Galileans of the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi.

Article II

The officers of this body shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, reporter, song leader, assistant song leader, pianist, assistant pianist.

- 1. The Galileans officer's sponsor shall serve as an advisor of his office: (president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, reporter).
 - 2. Qualifications of officers:
 - 1. Must profess to be saved.
 - 2. Member of the local church.
 - 3. Must be 14 years of age or older.

Article III

Time of meeting: The annual awards meeting shall be on the last Friday and Saturday in March.

Article IV

Composition of messenger body: The messenger body of this organization shall be composed of three (3) duly elected messengers from the Galileans of the local churches cooperating with the Baptist Missionary Association of Mississippi. The messengers shall be members of the churches they represent.

Article V

The purpose of this organization shall be:

- 1. The promotion of the cooperative endeavors of Missionary Baptists.
- 2. The promotion of fellowship among Missionary Baptist boys.
- 3. To assist in the establishment of local Galileans in churches which have no Galileans.
 - 4. To promote the growth of boys in Christian stewardship.
- To exchange ideas which have been found helpful in the promotion of the Master's cause.
 - 6. To bring churches closer together in their understanding and effort.

Article VI

The officers shall be elected to serve one year. If the annual election should be deferred for any reason, the present officers shall continue until their successors are elected.

Article VII

This constitution and bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting by a twothirds vote.

Article VIII

Award System:

- 1. The National Award System shall be used as a basis for choosing our Mr. Galilean Senior and Mr. Galilean Junior.
 - 2. The two boys elected will represent our state at the National Galilean Retreat.
- 3. Mr. Galilean Senior and Mr. Galilean Junior will be chosen on the basis of one year's work.
- 4. We encourage each church to send a representative to participate in State Galilean Contest. (One boy from Senior group and one boy from Junior group.)
 - 5. A committee of five (5) will be elected as a review council.
